Canadian Cities Face New Floods

VANCOUVER, B.C. (AP) — A warm, 24-hour rain which pelted down on snow-covered peaks in British Columbia's interior, has sent streams and creeks boiling over their banks and raised the level of giant rivers.

The snow, lying in unseasonable depths, is melting rapidly under the onslaught of rain and warm temperatures.

Already, Mill Creek, Renata Creek, the Kettle River and other small waterways are over their banks while at Mission, B.C., the end of tidewater, the Fraser River has risen 12 inches in 24 hours.

Mayor Fred Jackson of the Fraser River town of New Westminster, said the latest word he has received from the provincial gov-

ernment is that a definite change in weather is needed to avert more serious flooding.

"We need warm weather and then a cooling-off period," he said. "Everything points to a bigger run-off than during 1948."

In 1948 a late run-off caused floods which did 30 million dollars damage and sent 16,000 persons fleeing their homes.

"This year, Kelowna is the first town to report flood damage as Mill Creek flooded out six blocks of residential area in the center of the city, toppling small bridges

and forcing RCMP to throw up protective roadblocks. Kelowna is about 250 miles east of here.

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Sen. Hoey Dies After Long Career

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Clyde R. Hoey of North Carolina, an "old school" Southern gentleman who spent a lifetime in newspapering, law and politics, died yesterday. He was 76.

Distinguished by a courtly manner, flowing white hair and frock coat, he had served in the Senate since 1945 after a term as governor of his state. He was probably best known for his chairmanship of the subcommittee which investigated the 5 percent scandals in the Truman administration.

Hoey was the fifth senator to die in this Congress. One of the five, Sen. Willis Smith, was also a North Carolina Democrat.

The Senate lineup now stands at 47 Democrats, 47 Republicans and 1 Independent. A Democrat will doubtless be named to fill Hoey's place.

Dr. George W. Calver, physician to Congress, said Hoey apparently suffered a stroke and died in his sleep about yesterday afternoon. He was found seated at his office desk, not long after he had attended a lengthy committee session.

"He went the way he wished,"

said an aide, who recalled the senator saying that when he died he hoped it would come suddenly and while he was active.

William B. Umstead, North Carolina's Democratic governor, will name Hoey's successor. Unofficial speculation centered on Greg Cherry of Gastonia, a former governor, and Carlisle Higgins of Winston-Salem, a Democratic national committeeman. Umstead himself had no comment.

Born at Shelby, N.C., Dec. 11, 1877, he set out in the business world at age 12 as a printer's assistant. Four years later he bought a county paper, which he edited and published for the next 14 years.

He will be buried at Shelby Saturday afternoon.
