

Out Of Doors With The Sportsman

Big rainbows and German browns were the trophy of local anglers this past weekend, but very few of the fishing hopefuls returned home with their limits.

The mountain streams were high and murky, and the rain storms over the two day period didn't serve any profitable purpose, as far as lowering the high water marks of these creeks and rivers.

Klamath River, the old standby, was about the only stream in this locality that anglers were getting their quota of trout regularly.

Many Basin fishermen, including Lew Erbes and Pat Mockler, brought out their limits of fish from the river on spinning lures. The rainbows ranged from 10- to 18-inches in size.

Also being used on the river are plain old garden worms, which seem to produce catches when other lures fail to bring results.

From Wood River, several large fish, rainbows and browns, were taken the past week. The anglers were using anything from Wobblers, Andy Beckers and Rustle Lures, to single eggs and worms.

The winner in Pool's big fish contest last week was Neil Nelson of Port Klamath, who landed a 10-lb., 10-oz. trout from Wood River on a Wobbler lure. So far this week Jim Wu has the largest entry with a 9-lb., 6-oz. rainbow. The Bonanza angler also hooked his in Wood River with a Hot Shot.

Eagle Ridge continued to produce some nice size fish over the past couple of weeks. The major change as far as Klamath Lake is concerned, is that the fish seem to be moving up the lake with the more frequent catches being made around the ridge.

Again, everything from soup to nuts is being used to catch the unsuspecting trout. Reports have been that Ford Fenders and Doc Sheldons with worms have been working very well along the lake's shore line. Darderevils and Andy Beckers also continue to grab off a few of the nice rainbow and silver fish that are in the lake.

Rogue River and Malin seem to be in the favorites chair by all pre-meet information. Rogue River displayed plenty of strength in the Hayward Relays last month, and Malin won the Klamath County B track meet here last week.

Other entries that should give these two schools plenty of tough competition is St. Mary's, Jacksonville, Talent, and Prospect from the valley and Merrill's Huskies could very well place men in the state meet.

Ralph Hill, an ex-University of Oregon and Olympic star will act as meet referee in the district cinder meet.

The Owls will probably start their lefthanded pitching stars, Arvey Nelson and Ron Wright, in the two afternoon games. Nelson has compiled a 3-1 record so far this year, while Wright's 6-1 is tops for the Tech pitchers.

Besides these two, Kirkland will open with his hard hitting backstop Dick Joslyn handling the catching chores.

In the outfield, Warren Osborne will get the call for left field, and Gary Dorn will cover the center field territory. Right field will be capably handled by Lew Emerson.

Tech's infield will be comprised of Don Vest at first base, Larry Oatney at second and either Lee Oliver or Dave Savage will get the call for third base. Larry Jeter the only returning letterman on the starting lineup will hold down the shortstop position for the Owls.

In case they are needed, Glen Marcum and Ray Carrow can be called upon to supply plenty of relief work on the mound against the Vikings. Carrow is another veteran on the "young" club that Kirkland is building for the future years.

Next week the Owls tangle with SOC at Recreation Field Tuesday afternoon, and then travel to Monmouth for the Oregon Collegiate Conference tournament over the weekend.

Against Southern Oregon Kirkland will probably split the pitching duties to make sure they do not hurt themselves for the tournament.
