Big Y Market Change Made

The crowd of people lined up to wait for the 10 a.m. grand opening at the Big Y Market, 4710 South Sixth, this morning little realized the behind-the-scenes work that had been done to ready the market for the event.

All during the evening Thursday, cars and trucks brought the last remaining merchandise from the Big Y Market at the Lakeview junction which closed yesterday.

Inside the big market, everybody was working. In the rear of the store, where a large variety section has replaced the former meat counter and storage space, remodeling had not been completed. Ron Phair, co-owner with Dick Howard, commented that a teamwork only had made the opening possible.

"On one single scaffold, for instance," he said, "there would be a carpenter setting the acoustical board, a painter right behind him and an electrician adjusting the new fluorescent lights. Underfoot were men finishing laying the asphalt tile."

Through the night, one after another display was finished and the crew moved on to the next. Fresh vegetables were heaped in the long bins which have been arranged so they are serviced from the back with no muss in the customer aisles. Finishing touches were put on the big meat department and clean aprons donned by the butchers, headed by Howard.

Checkers spent the last few minutes taking away produce boxes, flicking off that bit of dust on a pyramid of cans, seeing that all sale price placards were in place and assuring waiting customers that the store would open in a few minutes.

"We didn't get a lot of sleep," Phair admitted, "but we made it."

Fee Successor Vote Reported

PORTLAND (AP) — Nicholas Jauregui, Portland attorney, is the man Oregon lawyers favor for appointment as the next federal district court judge at Portland.

He got 419 of the 1,593 votes cast in a poll of lawyers by the Oregon State Bar.

The runner-up for the position left vacant by elevation of Judge James Alger Fee to the appellate court at San Francisco was Circuit Judge Ralph M. Holman of Oregon City, who got 250 votes. Ten others got votes in the poll.

McMinnee, Tillamook, 28.

Funds Shortage Cause Of Arrest

SEASIDE (AP) — Dr. C. C. Dunham, ousted secretary-treasurer of the State Board of Chiropractic Examiners, was arrested here late Thursday night on a warrant charging larceny of public money.

The complaint, issued by District Clatsop County, was signed by Dr. Forrest I. Goddard of Salem, president of the State Board of Chiropractic Examiners.

Brownhill said the complaint charged that Dr. Dunham, Seaside chiropractor, had failed to pay to the state treasurer \$10 he received on Feb. 1, 1954. The district attorney said he had been told by the state attorney general's office that an audit of books showed a shortage of about \$9,000.

Bail for Dunham was set at \$6,000. Dunham was removed from office by Gov. Paul Patterson Wednesday. Dr. Goddard and Dr. J. E. Mitchell, vice president of the board, went to Seaside Thursday to take action in the case.

GIFU, Japan (AP) — Fire all but wiped out nearby Hongo village Thursday. Only three of the village's 119 homes escaped destruction. Kyodo News Agency said Friday, and 530 persons were left homeless. There were no reported casualties.

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
