Vet's Mailbag

Three tips to veterans who have special Korean GI Insurance were offered by Veterans Administration officials here.

"Almost 100,000 post-Korean veterans," VA announced, "have taken out special term insurance available to them upon separation from active service."

"Of these new policy holders, and to those who plan to purchase the low-cost Government insurance, VA has this to say:

First, get into the habit of paying all premiums when they are due. Although the law allows a "grace period" of 31 days during which the policy remains in effect even if the premium due is not paid, veterans should consider this provision an emergency measure and save it for such an emergency.

Second, DO NOT SEND CASH through the mails in paying premiums. Use a check or money order made payable to the Treasurer of the United States. Your cancelled check or money order stub will be your receipt.

Third, make sure to name your beneficiaries and have this information recorded by VA. This may be done through any VA office.

And a final bit of advice for those veterans of the Korean Conflict who have been discharged only a few weeks: If you plan to keep your GI insurance, you have only 120 days after separation from military service in which to apply for the special insurance. Note that — 120 days — and that doesn't mean four months, VA warns. One day too late and you lose.

QUESTION OF THE WEEK
Q. Since I was discharged before August 20, 1952, my deadline for starting training under the Korean GI Bill is this coming August 20. Must I actually be in school on that date, in order to continue afterwards?
A. Not necessarily. You must, under the law, begin your training before that date, in order to continue later. So long as you start in time, you won't be required to be in training on the date itself.

Reds Order Ballet Home

PARIS (AP)—A spokesman for the Russian ballet barred from performing here by French authorities said today the troupe had been ordered home by the Soviet government. He charged the French ban hindered "strengthening of cultural relations" between the two nations.

The spokesman read the announcement in Russia at a news conference and left the room before it was translated. There was no opportunity for questions.

The troupe will leave Le Bourget Airfield for Brussels today, the spokesman said and fly home via Brussels and Prague.

The Russian dancers arrived in Paris two weeks ago, but shortly before their scheduled opening the French fortress of Dien Bien Phu fell. The French government decided to cancel the first two performances and postponed the remaining ones indefinitely for fear of anti-Communist demonstrations.

Later British impresario Peter Daubeny invited the troupe to come to London for two or three weeks of performances beginning May 24.

The statement from the director, Michael Tchoulaki, said that the division of the French government was "unilateral" and "based on motives which cannot be considered valid."

Indian Peace Role Eyed

NEW DELHI, India (AP)—Prime Minister Nehru said today India would consider a role to promote peace settlements in Indochina and Korea.

Nehru told Parliament his government was not "angling" for an invitation to the Geneva talks on the two issues. But he added, if India were asked to take part in a settlement "we cannot avoid going and act as we did in Korea."

It marked the first time Nehru had publicly indicated India would be willing to take a hand in the Korean and Indochina issues.

Nehru's speech led off a foreign policy debate in Parliament's lower house. He said that peace cannot be imposed on Korea and Indochina, but must be negotiated. He added that both conflicts represent deadlocks between equal power blocs.

Tin Heiress Dies At 18

PARIS (AP)—Bolivian heiress Isabela Fatino Goldsmith died last night from a brain hemorrhage, bringing an end to a romantic story that was climaxed last January in a headline-making runway marriage. She was 18.

The youngest daughter of multi-millionaire tin magnate Antenor Fatino died in the American Hartman Clinic following an operation. At her bedside at the time of her death was her husband, James Goldsmith, 20-year-old son of a wealthy British hotel owner.

The couple swept newspaper front pages when they ran away to Scotland to marry in defiance of the elder Fatino. Irate, he pursued them and announced his intention to block the marriage. However, they were wed in Kelso, Scotland, Jan. 7, after he finally consented and indicated he had forgiven them.

The young bride, who was to have a baby next September, was found unconscious in a Paris hotel room Thursday. She was rushed to the American Hospital and then transferred across the street to the clinic, which works in close collaboration with the hospital.

The newlywed couple had been spending a long honeymoon on the French Riviera.

Isabela, fragile and dark-eyed, scored several royal French suitors to elope with Goldsmith.

Trial Of Former Dock Boss Ends With Jury Deadlocked

NEW YORK (AP)—The trial of Joseph P. Ryan, once powerful waterfront labor boss accused of stealing union funds, has ended in a mistrial with the jury "hopelessly deadlocked."

Nearly 30 hours after the case was turned over to the jury, it filed back into court last night to announce that two jurors on the all-male panel held firmly against the other 10 blocking a verdict.

Outside the court room, the jury foreman said the vote had been 10 to 2 in favor of finding Ryan guilty.

The onetime dockworkers' leader, robust and strong in his head but now ailing at the age of 70 had been indicted on 51 grand larceny counts accusing him of diverting \$48,000 in union funds to his own use. During the trial the counts were reduced to 42, totaling \$17,000.

Ryan betrayed little strain throughout the jury's long deliberations. Much of the time he simply sat silently and still, occasionally talking with relatives and friends.

In his defense, Ryan claimed he took union money only to reimburse himself for out-of-pocket expenses incurred in his fight against communism on the waterfront.

The state attempted to show that Ryan had dipped into the union till to provide himself with such things as a cruise to Guatemala, golf club dues, insurance, auto repairs and costly haberdashery.

Ryan, who gets a \$10,000 pension as retired president of the old International Longshoremen's Assn., was elected to the office in 1927 and led his union through action-packed feuds and fights.
