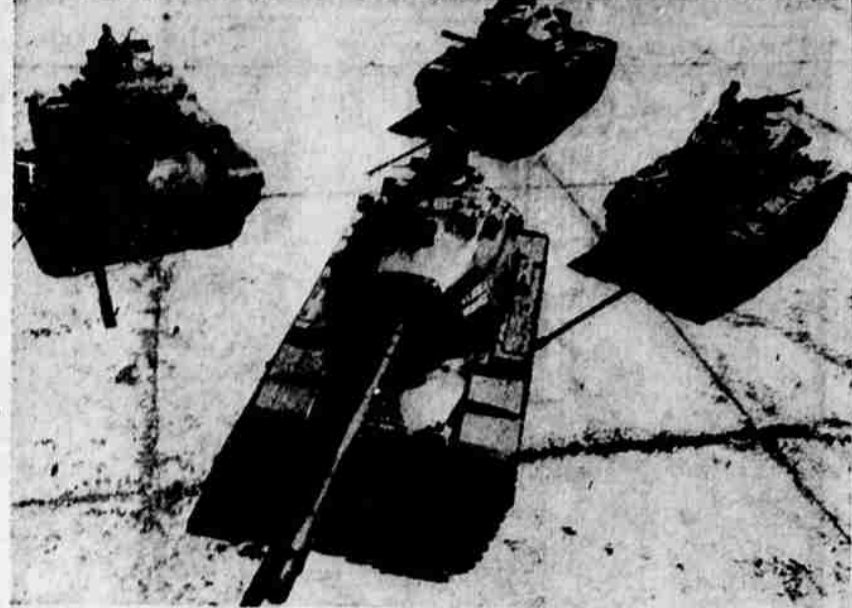
Child Support Charge Reported

Irving H. Warner, 43-year-old Klamath Falls truck driver, pleaded guilty Saturday to fraudulently collecting unemployment compensation when he was arraigned before District Judge D. E. Van Vactor.

Warner was arrested on complaint of D. L. Barker, Portland, investigator for the Oregon State Unemployment Compensation Commission. The truck driver admitted to Judge Van Vactor that he signed six false claims for \$25 each while he was employed. The court will pass sentence next Wednesday. Warner is free on \$250 cash bail.

CHAPEL HILL, N. C. (AP) — A University of North Carolina senior apparently shot two students and killed himself after an all-night beer drinking party in a fraternity house, Sheriff Sam T. Latta reported Saturday. The sheriff said "between 40 and 50 beer cans" were found in a bedroom in the Phi Delta Theta fraternity house, scene of the 7 a. m. triple shootings.

School Party Ends In Death

One student, Putnam Davis Jr., 23, senior from Larchmont, N. Y., was found dead in his bed, Coroner Allen Walker reported. The coroner said Davis, wounded in the head, was clutching a .22 caliber pistol. Two of Davis' fraternity brothers, William H. Joyner, about 20, of Summit, N. J., and Allen B. Long, 21, of Chevy Chase, Md., were wounded and admitted to the University Hospital.

SALEM (AP) — The State Supreme Court was asked Saturday to reduce the bond on Wey Him Fong and his Caucasian wife, Marjorie, now held at Portland on a charge of contributing to the delinquency of a minor. Attorney Irvin Goodman filed for a writ of habeas corpus, saying the present bond was excessive. He said the bond once was set at \$25,000 each for the Fongs, and later reduced to \$15,000.

Tiny Mrs. Etakuo Britton, 34, will board a Northwest Airlines plane for her homeland. Mrs. Britton tried suicide after she took the life of her son, Charles, last November, and twice since then.
