Huk Leader Gives Up In Philippines

MANILA (AP) — The surrender of Luis Taruc, colorful leader of the Communist-directed Huk rebels, was hailed today as a major step in President Ramon Magsaysay's campaign against the Huk.

Army combat teams surged through the jungles of southern Luzon seeking the remnants of Taruc's elite guard while Carlos P. Romulo, a top presidential aide, hailed the surrender as the end of the rebellion.

Chief target now is Jesus Lava, whom the army considers the top Communist in the Philippines.

Taruc, 40, who repeatedly has slipped through army traps in the past six years, surrendered to a Manila Times reporter, Benico Aquino, who carried a letter from Magsaysay. The meeting on a dusty road north of here climaxed months of negotiations.

Terms of the surrender were not disclosed.

"Taruc had no alternative but to surrender," Magsaysay commented. "He is cornered by the armed forces."

Unless granted amnesty, Taruc faces trial on charges ranging from murder to sedition.

The surrender was a major step in Magsaysay's efforts to bring about a peaceful settlement of the Huk uprising. Although a bitter foe of the rebels as a field commander, as defense chief and as president, Magsaysay long has advocated resettling the rebels on newly developed land.

At Kansas City, Mo., Magsaysay's personal envoy, said: "There now will be peace and order throughout the Philippines. Taruc is the man who had the following. With his surrender, the rebellion is ended."

Taruc was taken to army headquarters at Camp Murray on the outskirts of Manila. He was photographed and given a physical examination. A doctor described him as "healthier than the average man."

Taruc later was taken to the residence of Maj. Gen. Jesus Vargas, army chief of staff, and introduced to Mrs. Vargas. Said Taruc: "I am here because of your children and my children. I want them to spend the future in peace. It is doubtful if we could have peace in a hundred years if I did not give up."

Taruc, known as the Swamp Fox, surrendered to Aquino on the busy Quezon highway which skirts the Candaba swamps—a rebel lair.

The morning sun outlined the figure of the long-sought rebel, standing alone at the roadside.

"I pulled off the road and he met me with a big smile," Aquino said. "I said, 'Luis Taruc, do you unconditionally accept President Magsaysay's terms?'"

"I accept," Taruc answered, and his grip on my hand tightened.

But a staccato burst from an army machine gun in a clump of bushes 50 feet away brought weeping villagers swarming from their nearby huts. They hid Taruc until the firing stopped.

Aquino said the Huk leader soon reappeared and the pair raced in the newsmen's car to waiting security guards farther down the road. They then drove to Camp Murray.

The reporter said he carefully avoided the word "surrender" while he was a go-between for Magsaysay. Aquino said Taruc had agreed to accept the authority of the government.

Jet Bomber Plans Pushed

WASHINGTON (AP)—A test model of a faster-than-sound bomber may be flying within the next year.

High priority is known to have been given the project by the Air Force, which has watched with evident concern Soviet progress in both bomber and fighter-interceptor designs.

This interest sharpened with the display two weeks ago of a new heavy Russian bomber driven by jet engines of substantially greater power than any now in operational use by the U.S. Air Force.

The Air Force announced in December 1952 that it had asked Consolidated Vultee Aircraft Corp., builder of the B36 piston-jet-engine heavy bomber, to prepare detailed design studies for a "super-sonic bomber."

Since then, it was learned today, substantial progress has been made toward production of a prototype B58 jet bomber.

The increasing speed of new fighter models, both Russian and American, is a factor in the urgent push for development of a super-sonic bomber. The United States, and quite probably Russia, already has bombers in production that fly at the speed of sound (761 miles an hour at sea level, decreasing as altitude increases up to a certain point.)

If interceptors are up to sonic or super-sonic speed, then bombers must be as fast or faster if they are to be expected to reach their targets.

In addition to the matter of bomber vs. fighter capabilities, there is involved the American policy of deterrent power. If the United States continues to keep ahead of Russia in bomber quality and maintains supremacy in atomic weapons, Russia will continue to be discouraged from starting war. But if Russia takes the lead with faster and better bombers, which can elude U.S. interception, the deterrent factor is diminished or eliminated.

The B58 probably will be a medium bomber. Equipped for mid-air refueling, its range could be the same as that of a long distance, heavy bomber.

Pakistan Riot Kills Workers

DACCA, East Pakistan (AP) — A possible toll of 300 killed and 300 injured was reckoned today as a result of wild rioting Saturday among workers in the Adahjee jute mills at nearby Narayanpuri.

Troops sent in to patrol the mill area, 20 miles south of here, reportedly had restored order between hostile factions of local Bengali laborers and non-Bengali workers from West Pakistan. A curfew is being enforced nightly.

Minor disputes which broke out between the factions Friday night were fanned into fierce violence by Communist agitators, according to reliable sources.

Reports from the area said police had recovered 214 bodies, including those of women and children. A search still is going on along river banks and in ponds near the center of fighting.

The injured in hospitals numbered 263, it was reported.

In Karachi, Prime Minister Mohammed Ali held an emergency Cabinet meeting last night and later sent State Defense Minister Sardar Amir Azam Khan to Dacca to confer with East Pakistani officials.

East Pakistan is isolated from the Western part of the country by over 1,000 miles of Indian territory.

A group of influential politicians in Karachi, including leading members of Parliament, demanded in a press statement that Ali's government take strong action against Reds in Pakistan.

Karachi's English-language newspaper Dawn reported that Communists "have been pouring into East Pakistan without much difficulty" since the state's united front government came to power in March. The coalition, which defeated the Moslem League slate backed by the Karachi government, has Communist backing.

Meteor Reported In California

SAN JOSE, Calif. (AP) — That green ball of fire which flashed across Northern California skies Saturday night was a meteor, says an astronomer at Lick Observatory on Mt. Hamilton.

Dr. Olin Eggen said the meteor was of a type known technically as a bolide. He was one of the hundreds of persons who witnessed its fiery path.

Dr. Eggen said it struck the ground in the Isabel Valley, east of Mt. Hamilton, and burst into pieces probably up to 10 inches in diameter.

Police Hunt Escaped Cons

WALLA WALLA, Wash. (AP) — Law enforcement officers in Eastern Washington and Oregon set up roadblocks Sunday night in an effort to capture two state penitentiary inmates who escaped Sunday from the prison's new minimum security building.

Warden John Cranor said the men, Theodore I. Cottonware, 25, and Bob McDonald, walked away from the building some time before noon. Cranor said they were missed at the noon count and could have escaped during the night.

Cottonware and McDonald were among some 200 minimum security prisoners housed in the new 1 1/2 million dollar prison building located outside the walls of the main penitentiary. They were the first inmates to take advantage of the semi-freedom allowed in the new building, which was opened only last month.

Cottonware was sentenced for auto theft from Castle Rock. McDonald was serving time on a Kent burglary conviction. Both were due for release this summer, prison officials said.

New Insecticide Said Effective

TULELAKE (AP) — Favorable reports are being received concerning an all-around insecticide called Malathion, according to Ken Baghot, Tulelake farm adviser. Closely related to the powerful Parathion, Malathion possesses many of its insecticidal properties but is less toxic to man and warm-blooded animals.

Malathion is said to be effective against a wide range of insects affecting ornamentals, vegetables and fruits — scales, aphids, lacebugs, mealybugs, some leaf miners and most leaf chewing insects.

Some points to remember: It's odor is offensive to some people; it is somewhat expensive; it should not be applied to fruits or vegetables later than 10 to 14 days before harvest; and, even though less toxic than Parathion, Malathion is poisonous to man and animals and should be used with caution.
