

### Lake Junior Rodeo Planned

LAKEVIEW — A junior rodeo sponsored by the Elks Lodge and selection of the queen for the 1954 Lakeview Roundup next fall are new features which have been added this year to the annual jackpot rodeo of Lake County Roping Club, which will be staged at the Roundup grounds Saturday and Sunday, June 5 and 6. The show each day will start at 1 p. m.

The roping club's jackpot show will feature saddle bronc riding, bareback riding, team roping, steer stopping and wild cow milking.

Candidates for the queen of the 1954 Roundup will make their tryouts and the queen will be selected. Candidates so far are Judy Laird, sponsored by the Lakeview Roping Club; Beverly Vincent, Eastside Grange; Linda Klippel, Valley Falls Grange; Joyce Durham, the Lakeview Rotary Club.

The Elk's sponsored junior rodeo is for boys 14 to 18 years of age, inclusive, and they must have signed waivers from parent or guardian. Events will be breakaway calf roping and bareback riding.

For each event, there will be a purse of \$50 added to the \$2.50 entry fee. The Eagles Lodge is giving a silver buckle for the calf roping, Round-Up Tavern is giving a silver buckle for the bareback riding, and the Elks Lodge is giving a silver buckle for the best all-around cowboy.

The junior rodeo will be carried into the annual Roundup next September, with a championship bareback event to feature junior winners from Lake, Harney, Grant and Deschutes County junior rodeos. There will be a \$100 purse added to the entry fee, and a silver buckle for the winner.

### School Budget Vote Planned

LAKEVIEW — Voters of the Lake County rural school district will ballot Monday, May 17, from 2 to 4 p. m. on the matter of exceeding the six per cent limitation on the 1954-55 budget by \$123,158.30. Voting will be done at the school houses in each component district.

The total tax levy in the proposed budget is \$188,534 which is \$31,158 more than a year ago. The increase is due, said Mrs. Anne Sprague, county school superintendent, to proposed capital outlays, including purchase of two new school buses and some additions to school buildings, and to the fact that it is necessary to add two new teachers next year.

The millage levy will be higher next year for two reasons: First, the increased tax, and second, the fact that the rural district loses about \$170,000 of assessed valuation through annexation of the Crooked Creek, Crane Creek and Drews school districts to the Lakeview district.

### '54 Spud Crop Predicted

Production of early spring commercial potatoes is placed at 5,302,000 bushels — 14 per cent less than last year's record crop of 6,228,000 bushels, but 47 per cent larger than the 10 year average production, according to estimates released by the Department of Agriculture recently.

Indicated production for late spring harvest, at 35,652,000 bushels, is 25 per cent less than last year's crop of 47,333,000 bushels and 10 per cent less than average production during the 10 year period 1943-1952.

Production in California is placed at 25,200,000 bushels — 23 per cent less than last season. Growing conditions in California have been excellent and indicated yield per acre is the largest on record.

Acres for the summer harvest is estimated at 57,400 acres — 17 per cent less than in 1953, and more than half of the 10 year average.

Total 1954 acreage of early commercial potatoes (winter, spring, and summer) is now placed at 208,300 acres — 25 per cent less than 1953.
