

Request To Change Mail Service Told

LAKEVIEW — The postal transportation service is attempting to reinstate the Saturday night outgoing mail service from Lakeview in cooperation with a request submitted by the Lake County Chamber of Commerce. If successful, the return of Saturday evening service will be done in exchange for the Sunday night service which is still effective but which would be lost if the Saturday night service is restored.

The Chamber of Commerce felt that Saturday night service is more important for the mail going out from Lakeview than is the Sunday night service, and in order to cooperate with efforts of the postal service to economize, the chamber volunteered loss of the Sunday night service.

Possibility of making the change was expressed in a letter to Guy Miller, president of the chamber, from Paul G. Young, Portland, district superintendent of the postal transportation service, who explained that the change would depend upon whether the star route contractor involved would be agreeable to making the change. Young said that he had written the contractor asking for his agreement.

Rites Held For Lake Man

LAKEVIEW — Funeral services for Clarence Herbert Williams were held Saturday, May 15, at 2 p.m. from the Ousley-Osterman Chapel with the Rev. Carlton Babbidge officiating. Interment was at the Sunset Park cemetery.

Mr. Williams was found dead Tuesday morning, May 11, at the White Pine Lumber Company where he was employed as night watchman. Following an autopsy ordered by District Attorney Robert L. Welch, the coroner's physician listed coronary occlusion as the cause of death.

Mr. Williams had been a resident of Lake County for five years, employed at the White Pine Co. the past year and prior to that he worked for Plato Brothers and Lakeview Frozen Foods.

Born August 29, 1902, at Elmore, Minnesota, Mr. Williams was 51 years, nine months and 13 days of age. He made his home at 119 L Street, North.

On December 2, 1922, he was married at Pine City, Minnesota, to Verona Hady, who survives. Also surviving are three sons, Robert, Wilmer and Roger Williams, South Carolina; two brothers, Floyd and Chester Williams, Oakland, California; four sisters, Mrs. Loreta Reed, Mrs. Eunice Lange, Mrs. Sylvia Lange, Minneapolis, Minnesota, and Mrs. Margaret Officer, Flush, and six grandchildren.

Cool Air Covers North

Cool air covering the northern plains and northern Great Lakes areas pressed southward Monday, dropping sharply the summery temperatures of the weekend. Thunderstorms which deluged the southwest reached northward into western Nebraska.

In Massachusetts, the city of Peabody had the promise of fair weather in which to pick up the pieces after a rain-taxed dam burst, flooding its business section. There was still a scattering of light showers elsewhere in New England.

The cool air out of Canada

dropped the temperature to 48 at Milwaukee, 40 at Duluth and 33 at Jamestown, N.D. Over the weekend readings were some 30 degrees higher than these early morning readings. By contrast, 60-degree temperatures were recorded in southern Illinois and it was 68 in New York City. Skies were clear at all these points.

Heavy showers fell in Nebraska—Imperial had an inch and a half and Scottsbluff an inch and a quarter in six hours—but these storms extending northward from Texas

were less severe than the Sunday storms in New Mexico. Five business buildings and a residence were flooded in Clayton, N.M., after more than four inches of rain in an hour and a half. Hill drifts a foot deep were reported
