Boy Scouts Plant Trees

LAKEVIEW — Thirty six boy scouts of troops 12 and 15 took part in the Rotary Club's tree planting project on the city owned watershed east of town Saturday, May 8, and about 3600 ponderosa pine seedlings were planted, it was reported by E. B. MacKay, chairman of the Rotary youth committee, and Lloyd Gillmor, Fremont National Forest staff officer in charge of timber management.

The job was done by 2 p.m. and an area from which the ripe trees had been harvested a few years ago was in production again, both for future timber supply and watershed maintenance.

The boy scouts, nationally are stressing conservation this year, and locally they are taking part in the five way conservation programs sponsored by the Truman Collins-J. T. McDonald trust fund. While planting the trees they learned about care of trees, watershed improvement, and other conservation points as well as the actual tree planting.

Gillmor and MacKay were assisted by a number of Fremont personnel: Forrest Jones, Charles Waldron, Bill Steers and Frank Mauger. The scouts were led by George Lea, scoutmaster of Troop 12 and Millard Adams, scoutmaster of Troop 15.
