

Raiders Belt Tech Twice

Southern Oregon College took both ends of a doubleheader from the Oregon Tech Owls yesterday afternoon on Recreation Field, winning the first game 16-5, and then bouncing the home standing Owls 8-5 in the second contest.

In the first game, Southern Oregon scored three times in the second inning on a triple, two base on balls, Lloyd Hoffman's single and an infield out.

After scoring one run in the third and fourth innings, the Raiders collected six hits, and took advantage of five Tech errors, to score 11 runs in the top of the seventh inning. Ernie Breitzel's home run was the big blow of the 11 run outburst.

Tech scored twice in the first inning and then countered once in the fourth, fifth and seventh innings to compile their five runs.

Dave Savage paced the losing Owls with two hits in four trips, while Tiger Smith and Ned Landers had three safeties in three official times at bat.

The second contest was a closer game until SOC took a 6-0 lead in the sixth inning by scoring once in the fourth, twice in the fifth and then crossing the plate three times in their half of the sixth.

Oregon Tech came back in the last of the seventh after the Red Raiders scored twice more, to score all five of their runs.

Art Westhouse started the rally by gaining first base, with two out, on an error. Another error put Savage on base, and a walk to Larry Jetter loaded the sacks for the home team.

Gary Dorn then singled home two runs and placing men on first and third. Warren Osborne's double promptly scored Jetter from third, and with the help of two SOC errors, Osborne denied the plate for the final Tech run of the afternoon.

Dorn had two hits in three trips to lead the Owls in the second game, and Dick Price had three hits in four official trips for the Ashland school. Ned Landers helped his own pitching cause by collecting two safeties in three times at bat.

In the first half of the doubleheader, Hoffman was the winner and Ron Wright was credited with the loss. The Owl's left-hander went the full distance for Art Kirkland's crew.

Landers was the winner in the nightcap and Arvey Nelson, the other Tech southpaw, was the loser.

Dancer Causes Stir In Belmont Park Win

Vancouver Keeps WL League Lead

Vancouver kept its game and a half margin in the Western International League Tuesday night despite a loss to Tri-City and Spokane and Victoria posted wins that tied them in second place alongside Lewiston.

Temper flared and fists flew as Tri-City shut out Vancouver 7-0 behind three-hit pitching by Walt Clough. Spokane disposed of Lewiston 6-3. Calgary crushed Yakima 12-6. Wenatchee edged Edmonton 7-6 and Victoria clipped Salem 5-3.

The Tri-City Vancouver rhubarb at Kennewick developed in the ninth inning when Clough, after retiring two men, hit Dick Greco with a pitched ball for the second time of the game. Greco charged the mound, Clough sidestepped, and Vancouver coach George Nichols joined in, hopping on the pitcher's back. That brought players from both teams with fists flying.

Clough was restored and Nichols ousted. Clough sewed up his three-hit shutout by forcing Ken Richardson to fly out.

Tri-City fans "rode" Greco throughout the game. The outfielder refused to play for the Braves this season and purchased his own release to sign with Vancouver.

Perfect baseball weather brought out the largest crowd of the season at Spokane, 3,189 fans. They watched Will Hafey, who was celebrating his birthday, pound out a second inning homer that gave the Indians a lead they never relinquished. John Anderson, the distance for Spokane and spaced five hits. Grumpy Guy Fletcher was the losing pitcher.

It took Edmonton and Wenatchee nearly an hour to play two innings at Edmonton and two more hours to finish the game. First inning home runs by John McKeown, with two men aboard, and Andy Skurski started the Eskimos off with a 4-0 lead. Salem outslugged Victoria 11-8 but couldn't match the Tyees in the run-making department. Jim Flinn was the winning pitcher.

Stengel Hits Sox On Chin

CHICAGO (U) — Casey Stengel brought his New York Yankees to town yesterday and made the White Sox take it on the chin twice on the field and verbally.

The Yanks played before the largest home crowd of the season and pulled out a 4-3 victory over the Sox when Gene Woodling hit a two-run homer in the eighth and Yogi Berra knocked in a tie-breaking run in the ninth.

Stengel aimed at sweeping the two-game series by sending his ace southpaw "soft stuff" pitcher Ed Lopat, who has won five straight, against the Sox' Billy Pierce (2-3) today.

Adding to the Sox' discomfort—at least for General Manager Frank Lane—were Casey's observations on the Sox and Lane in particular. He softened this, however, with a complimentary remark about Sox Manager Paul Richards.

"Looks like Richards is doing a right good job again," said Stengel. "But it seems to me that other fellow out there (Lane), who does all the talking about the time he was getting himself a long-term contract with the Sox, should have thought about nailing Richards down with one too (Richards' current two-year pact expires after this season)."

"That guy's a pretty good manager, the way I watch him doing things. . . . And I shouldn't be telling" Lane to keep him because if he went out of the league, maybe I'd last longer myself. I kinda got an idea that a few other clubs might be interested in Mr. Richards for a term of years. You don't get managers as good as that one every time you pick, you know."

Does that mean the White Sox are the team Stengel fears most in the American League race this year?

"No," he said. "We fear everybody and we fear nobody, depending on the situation. The whole league is much faster. The Tigers and A's have more speed. . . . And we're not supposed to have much pitching. So maybe everybody'll be tied by September and we'll have to start all over again."

Tebbets Counts 'Gophers'

NEW YORK (U) — Manager Birdie Tebbets soon will be putting himself to sleep counting home runs, particularly if the Cincinnati pitching staff he tabbed "as good as any in the National League" continues to give up gopher balls at its present rate.

To date, Redleg hurlers have yielded 48 homers. That's the top figure in the majors and with lefty Harry Perkinson the individual leader with 10 "home runs off."

It's making Tebbets' freshman season as at the helm that much tougher.

Fred Baczewski, another Cincinnati southpaw, has given up nine circuit blows, a figure equaled by Vic Raschi of the St. Louis Cardinals. The other Redleg totals are: Corky Valentine 8, and Bud Podbielan, 7. Howie Judson 4, Joe Nuxhall and Art Fowler, 3. Hernan Wehmeier and Ken Raffensberger, 2, and George Zuverink, now with Detroit, 1.

In the American League, Cleveland's Early Wynn and Chicago's Billy Pierce are tied for the lead with seven apiece.

On a per-inning basis, Bubba Church of the Cubs is away ahead of the pack. The veteran right-hander has given up seven home runs in the 13 frames he's worked.

Curt Simmons of the Philadelphia Phillies and Mike Garcia of Cleveland have been the toughest pitchers for home run hitters. Simmons has yielded only one—by Ernie Banks of the Cubs—in 54 innings and Garcia one—by Sam Mele of Baltimore in 53 innings.

Except for Cincinnati, the pitching staffs of the Cardinals, 24, the Cubs, 30, the Athletics, 39, and the Giants, 29, have been the most vulnerable.

Baltimore pitchers have permitted the fewest gophers, 12.

In the two seasons with the National Industrial Basketball League, Chuck Darling of the Philadelphia Oilers has averaged 17.1 points a game. His 19.4 average in 1953-54 set a new league record.
