Klamath County elementary and high school students who participated in this year's conservation program on "Forests," are receiving recognition this week. The year-long project is designed to acquaint students with the value of forests to this country, to appreciate the needs of forests if they are to be perpetuated; to experience forestry activities; and to realize the responsibility of everyone toward forest conservation.

This is the fifth year that an attempt has been made to give conservation education real meaning in the schools of the Klamath County District. In past years, stress has been laid on other natural resources.

The program included work on scrapbooks, essays, charts, speech contests, collections, field trips, and other work pertaining to the subject.
