

Problems Face Legislators Over Atomic Law Changes

WASHINGTON (AP) — Legislators working on President Eisenhower's blueprint for a revised atomic energy law today faced two major problems of contention:

1. How to write into law the job of the Atomic Energy Commission chairman, who is now Lewis L. Strauss.
2. How far private industry should be allowed patent rights on peacetime atomic power improvements.

The Eisenhower-requested omnibus bill, now being considered by the Senate-House Atomic Energy Committee is designed to let private industry into the peace-

Guest Speaker To Be Heard

can nomination over three other candidates.

Benton House — Wayne Giesy, Monroe, defeated three Cortvalls men for Republican nomination.

Marion House — In the Republican contest for four House seats, the leaders are Eddie Ahrens, Turner, Mayor Al Loucks, Salem; and Reps. W. W. Chadwick and Robert L. Ellstrom, both of Salem. If Ahrens is elected, it would be the first time in 14 years that Marion County had a legislator who lived outside of Salem.

Cool House — James A. Norman, Coos Bay, defeated two other candidates for Republican nomination.

Crook and Jefferson House — Rep. Boyd R. Overhulse, Madras Democrat, won the nomination from two other candidates.

Wasco House — Thomas J. Carlson, The Dalles, a railroad union lobbyist at the Legislature for many years, won Republican nomination over Gladys B. Seufert, The Dalles.

Coos and Curry House — Rep. Roderick T. McKenzie, Sixes, won Republican renomination over one opponent.

Jackson House — The Republican winners are Rep. E. A. Mann and E. A. Little, both of Medford.

Multnomah House — All Republican and Democratic incumbents leading.

Alsike Tariff Change Asked

WASHINGTON — Late Friday afternoon the tariff commission sent a recommendation on alsike tariff rates to President Eisenhower. Its contents are not known, but Oregon members of Congress are hoping it will favor an increase in tariff rates on Canadian alsike which has been moving into the United States in increasing volume to the detriment of American growers.

Until recent years, the tariff on Canadian alsike imports was eight cents per pound. This has been gradually reduced until the tariff is now only two cents. Oregon growers are asking a return to the former eight-cent rate.

Four Rescued From Pacific

PEARL HARBOR (AP) — Four Navy airmen rescued from the ocean after their sea plane crashed 400 miles northeast of Oahu said last night there was no chance for other crewmen had survived.

The Hawaiian Sea Frontier said when darkness closed over the area the search for survivors was called off.

The four rescued were: Lt. L. W. Reber, pilot, Imperial Beach, Calif., suffering from shock and exposure.

Lt. J. A. Holmes, co-pilot, of Huntsville, Ala., exposure and fatigue.

H. R. James, machinist mate, first class, Coronado, Calif., broken right leg, minor abrasions, lacerations, exposure and fatigue.

R. W. Findly, radioman second class, Grovetown, N. H., no injuries.

Others aboard the plane were identified by the Navy as: Lt. J. E. K. F. Stout, navigator, Dayton, Ohio.

A. V. Bormann, machinist's mate second class, Los Angeles, Calif., California.

D. E. Hicks, radioman third class, Victoria, Tex.

The survivors said the plane hit, bounced, and broke into four pieces, after developing engine trouble.

Veteran News Writer Dies At 78

PORTLAND (AP) — Ralph Watson, whose writings once made him one of the best known political figures in the state, died early Saturday as votes were being counted in Oregon's primary election. He was 78.

His newspaper career spanned nearly 50 years—almost 40 of them on the Oregon Journal—but they went back to the days of Harvey Scott, great editor of the Oregonian.

He retired in 1947 as political editor of the Journal.

He began failing some weeks ago and sank rapidly in the last few days. His widow, Neva, and sister, Mrs. Hallie Millisp of Gates, survive. He was born in Marion County and lived always in Oregon.

His retirement from the Journal did not end his professional career. He joined the State Highway Commission as public relations consultant, serving four years. In 1953 he declared, "I've had enough" and quit work for good.

There were some breaks in his newspaper career. He practiced law for a time, and served four years as State Corporations Commissioner.

Watson — universally called "Doc" — attended the old East Salem High School, and attended Willamette University for three years. After a year at Stanford University, he returned to Salem to become city editor of the Capital Journal. His next newspaper job was on the Pendleton East Oregonian as a reporter. From there he came to Portland to work on the Oregonian. After a short time he returned to Pendleton to work for the Tribune. C. S. Jackson, founder of the Oregon Journal, persuaded him to return to Portland in 1906.

In 1911 he stepped out of newspaper work to become secretary for Gov. Oswald West, who two years later appointed him Corporations Commissioner. The same day he took this job he passed the state bar examination. He had studied under the late Sen. Charles McNary, then dean of the Willamette Law School. After his service as Corporations Commissioner he practiced law in Portland two years before returning to the Journal as political editor.

Funeral arrangements are pending.
