## Showdown Vote On Eastern Railroad Control Planned

**NEW YORK (AP)—**William White and Robert R. Young met face to face last night for the first time since they joined battle last February for control of the New York Central Railroad.

With a showdown stockholders vote on the dispute scheduled for this Wednesday, the meeting in a television studio was hardly cordial.

Both men smiled tightly when they shook hands before start of the program, Meet the Press, on CBS. Asked to repeat the handshake for benefit of photographers, White, who is now president of the railroad, refused.

"This is serious. I'm not going to make a pink tea of this," he said.

For the remainder of the half-hour program, in which the two railroad titans answered newsmen's questions, they avoided any further direct contact.

Most of the questions covered issues that had been repeated and answered over and over again in the tense contest for stockholders' proxies. The proxies are to be voted at the railroad's annual meeting in Albany Wednesday unless a court decision postpones it for another month.

Both White and Young claimed they were sure of victory, although White asked for figures on proxy strength. White replied:

"In a battle such as this, I don't think contending sides disclose their real strength. I don't propose to."

Young said he was sure of winning, even if 800,000 shares bought by two Texas friends of his are not voted. White has challenged the transfer of this stock from the Chesapeake & Ohio Railroad, which Young formerly headed, to Texas millionaires Clint W. Murch-

## Local Women Represent KF At League Of Voters Meet

Mrs. F. S. Kelsay and Mrs. Clifford Wood represented the local league at the biennial council of the League of Women Voters of Oregon, held at Sherwood Lodge, Yachats, May 16 to 18. Mrs. Frank Kehl and Mrs. F. W. Johnson attended as observers.

The council voted to support the constitutional amendment giving the legislature power to form sub-districts for Senate and House representation which was referred to the November ballot by the 1953 legislature. This question has been on the state program for the past three years and the conclusion of the members is reflected in the decision of the council.

The delegates also agreed that league members, following a year of study, believe that the Oregon constitution needs revision. They directed that a study of the various methods for revising constitutions, the historical background for revision and the basic principles of a constitution, beginning with those pertaining to the executive department, be studied during the next year. The intent of the council is that following the completion of such studies further exploration of the basic principles of constitutions be made.

A revised budget providing an increase in funds allocated to field service within the state of Oregon was adopted. Reports of program and platform adopted at the national convention were presented by Mrs. Charles Smith, Corvallis; Mrs. Charles Ford, Eugene; Mrs. W. O. Knox, Oswego and Mrs. Albert V. Logan, state president, four of Oregon's eight delegates to that session.

**BOSTON (AP)—**After studying Arthur Godfrey's year-old operation on his right hip, specialists have decided against further surgery for at least three months.

The TV-radio star flew here yesterday in his own plane for a detailed examination by Dr. Otto Aufranc, his surgeon, and Dr. Joseph Barr, chief of the orthopedic service at Massachusetts General Hospital.

Dr. Aufranc reported afterward there is "an almost normal range of motion in the operated hip." He advised more time should be given for corrective exercises and training in walking with crutches.
