S. G. Hadley Dies Sunday

LAKEVIEW — Lake County's oldest resident, and a native of Oregon, Samuel G. Hadley, Paisley, died Sunday, May 23 at a Lakeview Hospital. He was 97 years, 8 months and 20 days old at the time of his death. He was born December 3, 1856, on the Umpqua River near Myrtle Creek.

He was the son of Amelia and Samuel D. Hammond, who crossed the plains from Illinois by wagon train in 1851 to settle first at Oregon City.

In 1871, before the Modoc Indian War, he went to Summer Lake and his parents followed the next year. They settled on a homestead where the present John Withers ranch is located. They brought the first live stock to the Summer Lake country.

When he was 16 years old, young Samuel was herding sheep, living alone in a cabin near the site of the Adams Mill at Paisley. In his early youth he married an Indian bride and bridegroom, sent to him by neighboring cowboys. Although he insisted that he was not a minister, there were none in that part of Oregon and at the insistence of the couple, he said a marriage ceremony that lasted during the couple's lifetime. The service was read when he met them in the trail and dismounted to officiate.

He was married in 1911 to Paisley to Lillian Tucker Gaylord who died November 26, 1948.

Mr. Hadley spent his entire life in the stock business.

Surviving are three sons, Herbert L. Hadley, D.J. Lewis G. Hadley, Paisley, and Vinson W. Hadley, Portland. Six grandchildren also survive.

Funeral services will be held at 2 p.m. Tuesday, May 25, from the Methodist church, Paisley, with the Rev. Bruce Hollingsworth officiating. Interment will be in the Paisley IOOF cemetery. The Ousley-Osterman Funeral Home will be in charge of arrangements.

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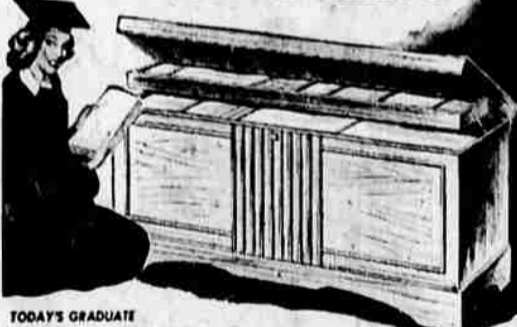
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
