Wounded Evacuated By Airlift

HANOI, Indochina (AP) — French army headquarters announced today 422 French wounded have been evacuated thus far from the fallen fortress of Dien Bien Phu. There still was no indication when nurse Genevieve de Galard Terrause would come out.

One hundred and thirty casualties — a record number for one day — arrived in Hanoi last night. They had been airlifted by helicopters and light planes to Luang Prabang, the royal Laotian capital, and flown the rest of the way in transport planes.

Sen. McCarthy Criticized

WASHINGTON (AP) — For the third time in less than a week, foreign aid chief Harold E. Stassen has used sharp words to criticize a foreign policy speech of Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.).

Stassen, in a radio-TV interview yesterday, said policies advocated by McCarthy in a Senate speech last week would "have America stand all alone . . . and a third world war would become more and more inevitable."

Asked if his statement indicated support for administration decision to get tough with McCarthy, Stassen said he spoke only for the Foreign Operations Administration, which he directs.

He and President Eisenhower have conferred twice since McCarthy told the Senate that with the possibility of American intervention in Indochina, "it is criminal folly to give money to allies who are shipping the sinews of military and economic strength to our enemies."

announced the Communist-led Vietnam had agreed to release a grand total of 658 wounded, including all nationalities represented in Dien Bien Phu's defense contingent. The rebels previously had said they would release 753.

A message from the Vietnam high command, received at French headquarters last night, promised to repair the main airstrip at Dien Bien Phu to make it usable for transport planes. The message asked the French to send army engineers and mine detectors to help remove mines from the field.

The message apparently replied to a French offer May 17 of aid in repairing the strip to speed the evacuation. French officers said the command had agreed to the rebel request.

The Vietnam message turned down an offer of French planes to help evacuate rebel wounded. It also hotly protested the French bombing of the main road leading from Dien Bien Phu to the Red River delta.

The French have charged the Vietnam are using the highway to rush guns and war material from the Dien Bien Phu area to the delta, another key target for rebel attackers.

The message asked for cessation of bombings around the fallen fortress but rejected a French proposal that a mixed control commission be established to govern traffic on the road while the Vietnam were evacuating their wounded.

The rebels said the suggestion was "nonrealistic" since the road was wholly under Vietnam control.

French fighter and bomber planes smashed at Vietnam convoys on the road again yesterday, cutting the highway in two places.

The French said no member of their mission at Dien Bien Phu had been able to see Miss de Galard yesterday, despite previous Vietnam assurances that the head

Two evacuated wounded veterans said yesterday, however, Miss de Galard had told them she hoped to leave in day or two.

Wage Increase Given Workers

PORTLAND (AP) — A 2 per cent wage increase and larger employer contributions into a health funds was agreed to Saturday at a contract negotiating session between two AFL unions and the Pacific Coast Assn. of Pulp and Paper Manufacturers.

John Sherman, Tacoma, vice president of the International Brotherhood of Pulp Sulphite and Paper Mill Workers, and Al Brown, Portland, vice president of the International Brotherhood of Papermakers, participated in the talks for the 18,000 workers in 37 pulp and paper plants in Oregon, Washington and California.

Also taking part were S. W. Grimes, Portland, secretary of the employer association, and Ivor D. Isaacson, Los Angeles, vice president of the papermakers. The agreement, to be submitted to unions' members with results

to be announced June 7, calls for: A general 2 per cent pay increase, which raises men's base rate to \$1.80 an hour and women's to \$1.50; employers to contribute 70 per cent, instead of 60 per cent as in the past, to the two-year-old health and welfare plan.

If approved, this would add about 2 million dollars a year to the industry's payroll, a joint statement from the management and the unions said.
