

# Veterans Have Big Day

## Feller Collects First Win

Baseball may be a young man's game but you can't convince Bob Feller, Ted Williams, Mickey Vernon, Preacher Roe, Marv Grissom and some of those other greybeards.

Led by these veterans of 36 or thereabouts, and the 39-year-old Ellis Kinder, the "Old Guard" had quite a day yesterday. Even such yearlings as 33-year-old Andy Patko and 31-year-old George Kell got ideas and joined in the fun.

Feller, who will be 36 in November, pitched his first victory of the season and the 250th of his career as the Cleveland Indians beat Baltimore in a double-header 14-3 and 2-1 to increase their American League lead to 2 1/2 games over Chicago.

The tribe had to go into extra innings in the nightcap to post their 11th victory in a row. Pitcher Art Houtteman won his own game with a 12-inning double that scored George Strickland. Al Rosen's homer in the ninth, his eighth in the last nine games, off Bob Turley, forced the game into overtime.

**TWO SINGLES**  
Williams banged two singles and drew three walks in six times at bat, drove in a run and scored three as the Boston Red Sox outslugged the New York Yankees 10-9. Kinder hurled the last three innings to receive credit for his second Boston triumph. The Red Sox tallied seven runs in the last three innings to knock New York into third place.

Kell, playing his last game for Boston, collected three hits, drove in three runs and scored twice. It was not until after the game that he learned he had been sold to the Chicago White Sox for undisclosed cash and infielder Grady Hatton.

Roe not only went the route for the first time this year but started on offense as the Brooklyn Dodgers captured a double-header from Pittsburgh 5-4 and 6-2 to climb into a tie with Milwaukee for first place in the National League. The grizzled southpaw, a notoriously poor hitter, smacked a single and double and scored what proved to be the winning run in the opener.

Duke Snider walloped two homers for the Brooks in the nightcap. Patko, playing in his 12th big league season, gave the big gun Milwaukee's double triumph over the Chicago Cubs. After driving in the tie-breaking run with a 10th-inning double in the Braves' 4-2 opening victory, he blasted two homers and a triple and drove in five runs in the 9-3 nightcap.

Reukie Ray Crone and sophomore Chet Nichols were Milwaukee's route-going winners.

**THIRD PITCHER**  
Grissom, third pitcher used by Manager Leo Durocher, held the Philadelphia Phillies scoreless in the final three innings, protecting New York's 6-4 lead. The Giants swept past the Phils into fourth place. Willie Mays batted in three runs with a triple and single off loser Curt Simmons.

Vernon, who joined Washington in 1940, clouted a home run and three doubles to lead the Nats to a 9-4 victory over Philadelphia's Athletics. Elmer Valo, 33-year-old outfielder, hit a three-run homer for the Athletics.

Eighth-inning home runs by Minnie Minoos, Cass Michaels and Sherman Lollar gave the White Sox all their runs as they came from behind to defeat Detroit 4-3. Relief pitcher Sandy Consuegra, 33-year-old right-hander, replaced 35-year-old Virgil Trucks in the seventh and received credit for his third victory without a defeat. Detroit's Steve Gromek, 34, had a shutout until he ran into the eighth-inning avalanche.

Outfielder Wally Post drove in five runs with a home run and double to lead the Cincinnati Reds to a 13-6 victory over the St. Louis Cardinals. The result boosted the Reds only two percentage points out of the first division and dropped the Cards from first to third place.

## Medford Drivers Dominate Speedway

For the second time in succession, Medford cars have won the main event prize money in the Sunday afternoon hardtop racing program.

Yesterday afternoon, Cecil James crossed the finish line in what could have been classified the best race of the day, although there were several close finishes in the number two program of the season.

John Hilton K-7 took an early lead in the A main and after two restarts, Bob Crawley K-66 began to make it a two car race for top money. About three fourths the way through the main event, James in M-1 took advantage of a few breaks and took the lead from the two local drivers.

In the last lap, James was leading and Hilton and Crawley fighting it out for second spot when Hilton's car caromed off the inside edge of the north bank, and before he could get his car back under control, Crawley finished second and Al Rossi in K-42 grabbed third ahead of Hilton.

The Semi Main was another top notch racing duel between Neal Mayfield in K-14 who finished first, and Wilbur McGilvray M-14 second place holder. Dale Hanks K-1 was third and George Smith in K-76 was fourth.

The Klamath car held the lead through most of the 15 lap race, and held off several serious threats by other challengers to the leader's spot.

Mayfield also won the consolation race, as he took the lead late in the 10 lap event. In a restart on the ninth lap, Mayfield took the deciding lead over George Smith K-76, who finished with second place money. Third and fourth spots went to Olen Reinhart in K-9, and Wes Owens in K-16.

Two cars were involved in single mishaps during the C race, and provided the hardtop fans with some excitement. Lloyd Cramer in K-39 took the south turn too high, and in the process of going over the embankment, rolled over and over before coming to rest on the car's side. Oregon Tech's baseball team split a pair of tournament games in Medford Saturday and took home their place honors in the Oregon Collegiate Conference division on Monday, while the Tech track team, four men, placed last in the conference track meet.

In the first ball game, played Saturday morning, Lefty Arvey Nelson had the Eastern Oregon College batters helpless until the Owl pitcher had two errors chalked against him in the third and the EOCE team countered three times to win the first half of the double elimination tournament at the OCE baseball field.

Eastern Oregon scored their three runs on a single, a holder's choice and the two errors against Nelson. The southpaw except for the third had limited the opposition to one hit over the nine inning contest.

In the second game of the day, Tech took a 5-2 win from the Portland State Vikings behind the five hit pitching of Ron Wright, the second Owl southpaw.

PC's pitcher, Ron Kostella limited the Owls to two hits, both were collected by Dick Joslyn, but those were too many for the Vikings' own good.

Joslyn homered in the first after Larry Jeter walked to give the Owls a two run lead. In the sixth, Jeter walked and Warren Osborne also got to first on a base on balls. With men on first and second, Joslyn blasted out a long two run double, and scored a few minutes later on Portland State misplays.

The split gave the Owls a season record of 16 wins against 11 losses to a ballclub that had just one returning letterman on the starting lineup.

In the second game Ted Beard homered for the Seals in the deciding run in the doublet. Frank Hiller hurled a three-hit, no-run effort.

Hollywood polished off Sacramento twice, 4-1 and 3-0, thus winning that series five games to two and moving 1 1/2 games out in front.

San Diego slid into the runner-up slot again, by winning a pair from Oakland, 7-3 and 7-2.

## White Sox Acquire George Kell

CHICAGO (AP) — In a lavish, uncharacteristic gamble, the Chicago White Sox paid a reported \$100,000 for hard-hitting George Kell and famed slugger, Paul Cavarretta.

Frank Lane, the Sox general manager, got third baseman Kell from the Boston Red Sox for reserve infielder Grady Hatton and cash — so much that Red Sox General Manager Joe Cronin "couldn't turn it down."

Lane didn't announce the amount involved but Manager Paul Richards, when asked if it was \$100,000, said: "I think that's pretty close." In a further effort to shore up the Sox for a determined pennant drive, Lane appeared on the verge of taking on Cavarretta, the deposed Chicago Cubs manager, as a pinch hitter and coach.

Kell has hit over .300 the last seven seasons and Cavarretta has a lifetime .292 batting mark in 19 seasons at first base for the Cubs. With the Sox pitching staff manned by experts — Richards says it's the best in the American League — the weak-hitting Connie Mack club needed a player of Kell's batting ability badly. Richards said only Saturday that the club had to find a dependable slugger to stay in the race. Sox pitchers were hurling five and six-hit games and losing.
