

BPW Delegates Give Report

Business and Professional Women, meeting May 17 heard reports of delegates to the state convention in Portland, made plans for a meeting at Merrill, and were honored by attendance of several members of Camp Fire Girl groups.

Those attending the convention were Beulah Elliott, newly elected president; Imogene Boothby, retiring president; May Phinney, Maude Davis, Dorothy Lowell, Kathleen Kris and Roy Smith.

It was reported that 52 of the 54 BPW clubs in the state of Oregon were represented at the state meeting at which 474 delegates were present.

The attendance was the largest ever recorded at a state convention. The interest this year made it possible to send two delegates instead of one to the national convention to be held this summer in St. Louis Missouri.

Miss Phinney who served on the state nominating committee last year was reelected to the chairmanship of the same committee. Mrs. Boothby accepted the office of district chairman for Southern Oregon.

Troop leader, Mrs. Art Moore, president of the Camp Fire Council and her daughter Barbara, a six year Camp Fire Girl with Joan Beard, Horizon Club member, were presented by Naomi French, executive director of Camp Fire. They spoke briefly on Camp Fire activities and aims.
