This recently formed organization has for its purpose, the advancement of the social and economic interests of the blind, and is composed of legally blind persons, and sighted associate members, who are interested in the welfare of the blind.

This new council completed its organizational work at this meeting, including the appointment of committees. It was voted not to affiliate with the National Federation of the Blind, and not to participate in the White Cane fund raising program on a state level.

He isn't kidding. Although Lou is under doctors' orders to lay off the rougher routines, his violent kind of comedy puts him in jeopardy. Abbott, too. He's the straight man, but he has had his share of knocks.

"The boys were telling me about their mishaps. I concluded they should have a charge account at some nearby hospital. "Whenever I finish the TV show, I'm blooey and bruised," Lou said. "After they touch me up with plaster and bandages, the first thing I have to do is call my mother. She's a very nervous type and I have to assure her I'm not badly hurt."

"Once I did a routine with a 'ei helmet that slipped and cut up my face. When I walked out of the theater that night, a man said to me, 'I just saw Art Aragon get whipped in the ring by Jimmy Carter, and he looked better than you do!'"

"On one show, the punch line in a sketch was to have Lou get hit over the head with a vase. Bud and the vase broke early in the act, and Bud had to scurry around backstage to find another one. It turned out to be a real vase, not a breakaway. A girl clouted Lou with it and nearly knocked him out."

"I got mine during a show we did in New York," said Bud. "We had a sketch where a lady took
