Thailand Issues War Statement

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP)—Thailand does not want to become involved in the Indochina war, Lt. Gen. Mon Luang Kharb, deputy chief of the Thai Defense staff, said today.

Kharb said Thai troops sent to the border were only "to protect Thailand and to prevent Communist invasion."

The statement was prompted by a Communist Peking radio broadcast Saturday quoting a Bangkok newspaper as saying Thailand was preparing to "interfere" and had strengthened ground and air forces on her northern frontier.
