Reds Said Unfit For UN

CHICAGO (U. P.) — Henry Cabot Lodge Jr., United States representative to the United Nations, declared Tuesday he considers the Chinese Communist regime "wholly unfit" for representation in the U. N.

He called it a "strange paradox" that the Chinese Communists demand to be let into the U. N. while at the same time persistently attacking it.

He drew up an indictment of the Chinese Communists which the United States mission to the U. N. described as "the most comprehensive bill of particulars yet presented by a United States official against Chinese Communist representation in the U. N."

In an address prepared for the 70th annual spring meeting of the Inland Daily Press Assn., Lodge's counts ranged from charges of direct aggression to the use of narcotics for subversive purposes.

Lodge said that, considering their policy and practice "it seems to me a very strange kind of moral blindness which can advocate that the Chinese Communists be regarded as a 'peace-loving' state fit to sit in the United Nations."

"I can promise you here today that the United States will steadfastly resist all maneuvers by the Chinese Communist regime and its advocates to bribe its way into the United Nations on mere promises of good behavior in the future."

Lodge accused the Chinese Com-

munist of being "guilty of Un-grant aggression" — direct aggression in Korea, concealed aggression in Indochina and internal aggression against the Chinese people.

Mercy Airlift To Be Finished

LUANG PRABANG, Indochina (U. P.) — The French hope to wind up their airlift of wounded out of shell-pocked Dien Bien Phu within the next three days.

The slow mercy shuttle hit a record high yesterday when 150 casualties—including the first batch of French officers and some Vietnamese—reached Luang Prabang. They were relayed by Dakota transport to Hanoi's Lannan Hospital after first aid treatment here.

That brought to 573 the total airlifted from the captured fortress so far. There are 313 yet to come out of the thick jungle of north-west Indochina. With good weather the French expect to complete the operation by Thursday night.

Vicious Fish Caught By Hand

PORTLAND, Ore. (U. P.) — Tom Baker, 20, is one of the few persons who have caught a hand-saw fish, and perhaps the only one to do it with his bare hands.

The deep water fish was a slender, 4½-foot-long member of the vicious lancet family. It had a mouth eight inches wide, full of knife-like teeth.

Baker, an Airman third class from Columbus, Ohio, now stationed at Portland, came across the fish in four feet of surf at Cannon Beach. He grabbed the scaleless, muscular fish near the tail and somehow managed to dodge the teeth while tugging it shoreward.

A State Game Commission expert identified it yesterday, explaining it is rarely found near a shore.
