Jean Hersholt To Be Seen In Movie Role With Cagney

HOLLYWOOD (AP)—For the first time in 17 years, Jean Hersholt is parting company with Dr. Christian.

The great Dane is playing one of the leading roles in "Run for Cover" with James Cagney, Viveca Lindfors and John Derek. It will be the first time since 1937 that the public has seen or heard him in any role except that of the kindly Dr. Christian.

"I want to see if I can get away with doing something else," says Hersholt. "After all, Dr. Christian is such a sweet, sentimental fellow, I'd hate to be stuck with playing only him for the rest of my life."

"Two whole generations have grown up knowing me as nothing else but Dr. Christian. Yet I have played in over 400 pictures and done every kind of a role, including many heavies."

He'll be no heavy in this one. He plays Miss Lindfors' father, a stubborn Swede who is a frontier farmer.

I visited him at this Beverly Hills home, where he has lived for almost 30 years. He looked the same as ever, except that he had grown sideburns and a brush mustache for his film role. He relaxed in his upstairs study, a room laden with medals and trophies, including three honorary Oscars and awards from foreign countries.

"I have no beef with Dr. Christian," he said, puffing on a pipe. "He has been very good to me. I was on radio every week, summer and winter, 18 years with the same sponsor. I don't believe any other show can match that record."

I asked him if Jean Hersholt and Paul Christian are the same person.

"I don't like to think so," he replied thoughtfully. "I like to think I have an identity of my own. That's one of the reasons I am doing this picture. I want to prove that I can do something else."

That doesn't mean he's abandoning the Doc. The show has gone off radio for the present. But Hersholt has made a pilot film for a TV series, and he may get active in that medium.

Long Forgotten Debt Repaid

Tulana Builds Grain Storage

Construction of a 1,100,000 bushel grain storage plant at Worden was started this week, according to officials of Tulana Farms.

The elevator, which will be one huge bin, is being built directly across the highway from the present Tulana elevators on the Southern Pacific at Worden. An overhead belt conveyor 51 feet above

the highway will carry the grain to or from existing elevators, or to cars for loading.

The structure will be 400 feet long and 100 feet wide with 32 foot sides. The walls will be constructed of concrete and the roof will be steel trusses covered with sheet metal.

C. E. (Slim) Blakley, for many years superintendent for the C. A. Dunn Construction Company will be in charge of construction.

The belt conveyor system will be capable of moving 10,000 bushels of grain per hour either to or from the bin. It is expected the storage plant will be ready for operation by harvest time this fall.

A blower type ventilating system will be installed and while this is not a dryer it will help to dry and condition the seed going into storage, officials stated.

Nematode Control Discussed

TULELAKE — Much has been said about nematode in potatoes this last winter in this area. Among other control methods, the possibility of killing the nematode embedded in the potato tubers has been discussed. Numerous materials to attempt this have been tried, with no appreciable success. However, it is common for many growers to have their potato seed dipped and expect eradication of nematode in the potatoes, states B. J. Hoyle.

Last fall the Tulalake Field Station conducted an experiment using the potato dip as prescribed by local dipping vats. This treatment consisted of using corrosive sublimate which is the common name of bi-chloride of mercury. The treating of potatoes as recommended by the U.S. Department of Agriculture is one part to one thousand parts of water. The treatment should be given at room temperature, from 60 to 70 degrees for 1 1/2 hours.

This treatment is now to be effective in killing the scab organisms and rhizoctonia organisms, but not nematode. As mentioned earlier some nematode infested potatoes were dipped in mercury solution as indicated, but one lot of potatoes was dipped for three hours, which is twice the length of time for dipping. These potatoes were then taken to the University of California at Berkeley for further study by Nematologist Dr. W. M. Allen, and then planted in the greenhouse and examined to see if the nematode was killed.

The following excerpt is from his report: "So far as we can determine, the mercury dip did not kill nematodes inside the potato tubers. It was necessary for us to chop up these tubers and mix the chopped material with soil, plant tomatoes, and examine the tomato roots for nematode infection. Both untreated and treated were found to produce infection on tomato roots. There were fewer nematodes on tomato roots grown in soil inoculated with the dipped tubers. However, this might have been due to a lighter infection in these tubers."

"The most important point is that dipping did not kill all of the nematodes inside the tubers."

Air Force Plane Crashes In City

NEWARK, Del. (AP)—An Air Force twin engine plane crashed into a lumber yard in downtown Newark last night and exploded into a terrific blaze. No one was injured in the fire and both the pilot and copilot safely parachuted over the city.

The C-45 exploded on impact and the flames, fed by a half million dollars worth of lumber, leaped 100 feet into the air.

The two flyers were taken to the New Castle County Air Force Base near Wilmington, 12 miles north-east of Newark. A spokesman said there would be an investigation.

The plane was on a routine non-stop training flight from Mitchell Air Force Base, Long Island, N.Y., to Washington, D.C. and return.

The pilot, Capt. Leroy B. Hansen, 32, of Salt Lake City, Utah, said the ship suddenly developed engine trouble and when emergency measures failed, he and copilot Capt. Howard N. Franklyn, 32, of Medford, Mass., bailed out.

Radford To Meet With Congress

WASHINGTON (AP)—Adm. Arthur W. Radford, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, gives congressmen a secret insight today at the problems of creating a defense coalition for Southeast Asia.

Radford was called before the House Foreign Affairs Committee in closed session to outline the administration's program for putting into effect Secretary of State Dulles' plan for united action to combat Communist aggression in the area.

The admiral was expected to ask formally for authority to use anywhere in Southeast Asia the \$1,133,000,000 now earmarked for Indochina, primarily for military aid, for the year starting July 1. The committee is studying the over-all \$3 1/2-billion-dollar aid program, on which this is a part.

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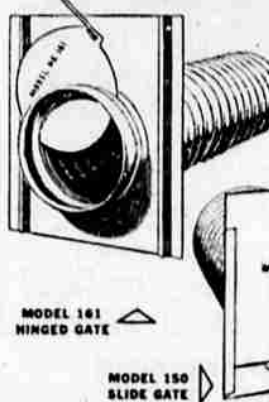
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
