Cafe Plans Open House

In 1941 the party room in the basement was opened for luncheon meetings, receptions and parties. The Candy Jar, a confection and gift shop featuring Klamath's own wild plum preserves and candy was added in 1946.

In 1953 with the advent of liquor by the drink in Oregon, a lounge was opened and mixed drinks served. The interior of the lounge has been refurnished in a rugged knotty pine and decorated with relics of early times in the Klamath county.

The lounge, to be known as the Pelican Wing, has its own private entrance through the Williams building.

Free coffee will be served all day Friday and the public is invited to drop in and inspect the new addition.

Wheat Mite Found In TL

TULELAKE—Unusually heavy infestations of the brown wheat mite has been discovered in the Southwest sump, the west side of the League of Nations, and the Frog Pond areas of the Tulelake basin, according to Ken Baggett, farm adviser.

This mite is causing considerable damage to barley seedlings and where populations are the heaviest, large areas in the grain fields are turning brown which indicate possible killing of the barley unless control of the mite is accomplished soon.

The farm adviser in contact with the Entomology Department of the University of California, makes the following recommendations. For control, use one pound parathion per acre which should be applied as soon as possible. It might be possible to incorporate the parathion with 2-4-D, thereby accomplishing weed control and mite control at the same time, though the miteicide may not combine effective with 2-4-D.

The mite thrives on warm dry weather conditions, and will not survive cool, moist weather. A rain storm would probably eliminate them for the rest of the season. The unusually dry, warm weather has brought forth the mites this year. The mite lives from 7 to 10 days, and during this time lays from 70 to 100 eggs. Many of these eggs will hatch within two weeks time, and a small portion of them may remain in the soil and hatch the following year so complete control cannot be expected in one year. The mite is not a migrating insect and should move or less confine itself to one field.

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Neuberger Hits Power Policy

"The taking over of the Bonneville power line by the California-Oregon Power Company was a blow to the future prosperity of Klamath County," declared State Senator Richard L. Neuberger, Democratic nominee for U.S. Senator when he visited Klamath Falls on Wednesday.

Neuberger claimed that the selling of the transmission line to the utility company was "a give-away put through by Senator Cordon and Secretary McKay, and which is now being paid for by the ratepayers of the Klamath region by a staggering 16 per cent increase in their power bills."

Neuberger contended that the taking over of the Bonneville line gave the utility corporation "a monopoly" into the Klamath region. "This monopoly," said he, "prevents Klamath from having true low-cost power to attract payrolls and to give farmers cheap rates for irrigation pumping."

The Democratic candidate, who is an author in private life, declared that "if there could be booming aluminum industries with Bonneville power in Kalispell Mont. and Wenatchee, Wash., there could have been in Klamath Falls, too, but that hope is now gone because of the bargain-basement sell which disposed of the transmission line to COPCO."

Neuberger contended that, in his opinion, the government should take back the line, paying the company a fair price, and "the rate-payers given immediate relief from the 16 per cent increase foisted upon them by the Republican utility commissioner at Salem, Ore."

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
