WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Hope (R-Kan.) predicted after a conference with President Eisenhower Wednesday that the House will pass a compromise farm bill, probably short of the administration's request for a shift from rigid to flexible price supports.

Hope, chairman of the House Agriculture Committee, made the prediction to newsmen after he and three other members of the committee had conferred with Eisenhower for an hour and a half at a White House breakfast.

"It is my feeling we will agree in committee on a good sound compromise bill, and that the House will pass it," Hope said.

Playing on the Alturas team were Dave Smith, Bob Stratton, Esile Argabright, Jr., Richard Keene, George Sloss, Leo Hoag, Delmar Hawkins, Marvin Essex, and Wayne Kramer. The trophy will remain in Alturas until won by another team. The next tournament will be sometime in October.

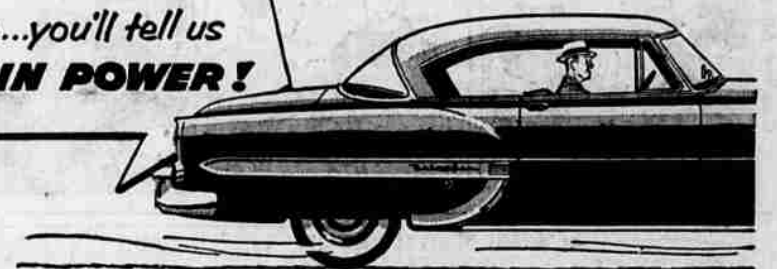
