

Power Policy Seen As Main Issue Of General Election

SALEM (AP) — Oregon's citizens should brace themselves for one of the most rip-roaring political campaigns the state has ever seen, with the power issue providing most of the fireworks.

In contrast to the sleepy primary campaign we've just been through, the November election contests will provide several real donnybrook.

The stage is set by Democratic demands that the federal government develop the Columbia Basin's power resources, while the Republicans want them developed in a partnership between all public and private power agencies.

In at least three of the contests, the voters will get a clear-cut chance to decide what kind of a power policy they want.

The best test is in the race between Sen. Guy Cordon, Republican who is running for re-election against State Sen. Richard L. Neuberger, Portland Democrat and a writer.

Eastern Oregon voters can vote their power sentiments in the contest between Congressman Sam Conner, Republican who seeks a second term, and Albert C. Ullman, Baker Democrat who leads the Idaho Hells Canyon Assn.

And in the battle between Gov. Paul L. Patterson, Republican who inherited his job from ex-Gov. Douglas McKay 17 months ago, and ex-Mayor Joseph K. Carson Jr., of Portland, the power stakes also are high.

This crucial power question also will play a big part in the re-election campaigns of the three Republican congressmen in Western Oregon.

The national party organizations are expected to send a lot of money to Oregon to help finance Cordon and Neuberger. This race is very important nationally, because the U. S. Senate is almost evenly split, and each party needs to win every

race it can.

U. S. Sen. Wayne Morse, who bolted the Republicans in the 1952 presidential election campaign to become an independent, already is making speeches for the Democrats in Oregon, and he says he'll make many more.

Interior Secretary McKay is said to be itching to come home to work for Cordon. Republican leaders also hope that President Eisenhower will make a speech here on Cordon's behalf.

It looks like six months of fun ahead.

In the field of primary election post-mortems:

Gov. Patterson's huge victory margin over Secretary of State Earl T. Newbry took the statehouse by surprise.

Nearly everybody here, except Newbry, thought Patterson would win. But nobody predicted Patterson's tremendous victory margin. Newbry was very shocked and surprised.

It proves that Patterson is a vote-getter ranking with the late ex-Gov. Earl Snell and Douglas McKay. This was the first time that Patterson ran for a statewide office, too.

It looks like Newbry's political career has ended. It's hard for any politician to survive a beating like he took.

Newbry, then a Jackson County state senator, was appointed secretary of state seven years ago.

He has two years left in his term, and the Constitution says he can't run for re-election. Newbry could run for the U. S. Senate against Wayne Morse in two years, but that possibility isn't even being considered.

Democrats in the Legislature have complained long and loud about the fact that the secretary of state has a huge publicity advantage in getting his name on license plate documents and other state documents. They have said that this amounts to a free pass to the governor's chair.

Newbry proved it isn't true. In fact, Earl Snell was the only secretary of state who ever was elected governor.

The voters will hear a lot of dull speeches, and some good ones, too. A little weary from hearing too many campaign speeches during the recent primary, I can look back on the best address I ever heard. It wasn't an election speech, though.

Dr. Douglas Horton, New York City, national secretary of the Congressional Christian Churches, made the feature address last week at the State Congressional Church Conference in Forest Grove.

Sensing that the crowd wanted to go home, he said only this: "My address is 480 Fourth Ave., New York City. I thank you."

Then he sat down, and the 200 delegates roared their approval.

That might be a good way to get votes, too.

Car Dealers Protest State Sales

SALEM (AP) — Protests by Salem used car dealers against the state's practice of selling its used cars to the public were rejected Wednesday by State Finance Director Harry S. Dorman.

"Our policy of letting the public buy used cars from the state saves money for the taxpayer, and is in strict conformity with the law," Dorman said.

Dorman said that since last December, when he began inviting the public to buy used cars from the state, the state's receipts on used cars have averaged from 86 to 96 per cent of low Blue Book value.

In sales during June and August last year, when the public wasn't

told about the sales and when all of the state's used cars went to the dealers, the state got only 56 per cent of low Blue Book value, Dorman said.

Dorman said his department is prohibited by law from excluding the public from its sales. The reason that the public didn't bid on state used cars before last December was that he didn't advertise the sales except to the dealers.
