Stars PCL Lead Growing

The Hollywood Stars have lengthened their lead in the Pacific Coast League to six games and Seattle has edged back into second place in the standings. Hollywood bumped San Diego Thursday night for the third time in a row, 4-2, as big Bob Hall snapped a three game losing streak by outpitching Dick Kerrigan. Hall drove in two of the Stars' runs in the second with a single. It was the eighth consecutive victory for Hollywood and its 23rd in the last 27 games. Seattle was in a hitting mood and stopped the surge of the San Francisco Seals, 7-4. The Rainiers pounded out 12 hits and Ray Ortleig, husky catcher, collected three of them, two being homers. Ortleig was a one man wrecking crew, his hits driving in five runs. Bill Evans was the winning pitcher, although he had to be rescued in the eighth, when the Seals got two runs.

Los Angeles won a doubleheader from Portland, taking the first game 1-0, and the second, 7-4. Dick Waibel gave the Angels only three hits in the opener, but Fred Richards drove in the game's only run in the seventh. The opener was a seven inning affair. Bob Spicer was the winning pitcher. He gave five hits.

In the second game both starting pitchers were shelled in the showers in the first inning as each team scored four times. Randy Gumpert took over from John Pyscha for the Angels and won it, with help from Joe Hatten in the ninth when the Beavers lashed the bases. Dick Fiedler relieved Red Adams for Portland and was the loser. Dixie Upright homered for Los Angeles in the seventh.

San Diego, which was in a two-way tie with Sacramento for second place, dropped into a fourth place tie with the Seals, who bowed to Oakland. The Oaks overpowered the Solons, 7-4.

The way the St. Louis Cardinals have been playing at home this season you'd almost think they were trying to help the fans remember the old Browns.

The Cardinals obviously are a better ball team than the Browns were. But a quick glance at their Busch Stadium record raises strong doubts that the players share owner August Busch's determination that the club must remain in St. Louis.

In 22 games at home this season the Cardinals have won only 10. And just twice have they been able to put a pair of victories back to back.

A week ago today they came home from their first long Eastern trip in first place. Last night they pushed out of town in second division. Between times they had dropped five out of seven to Cincinnati and Chicago, both lower bracket clubs, and strided from first to fifth.

Although the pitching faltered and Vic Rasca got hurt, no one thing seemed to be the trouble. It was just that things which worked on the road didn't at home.

The fact the Cardinals' over-all record still is above .500 is due entirely to their road play where they've won 11 and lost 7.

The Cards dropped to fifth during yesterday's abbreviated program, bowing 7-3 to Chicago. Philadelphia trounced Brooklyn 11-5. Washington tripped the New York Yankees 7-3 and Detroit handed Baltimore its seventh straight loss, 7-1. The eight other clubs weren't scheduled.

Hank Sauer hit his 14th home run, tying him for the National League lead with Stan Musial, and Ralph Kiner hit his seventh homer as the Cubs collected a dozen hits off Gerry Staley and Stu Miller of the Cardinals. Musial went hitless in three appearances.

The Phillies scored in every inning except the first and last at Brooklyn. Their 14th attack against five Dodger pitchers included seven extra-base blows, three of them home runs by Johnny Wyrostek, Willie Jones and Earl Torgeson.

Don Newcombe, making his first start after missing two turns because of arm trouble, lasted only 2 2-3 innings and was charged with his third loss. He won three.

In Washington the Yankees looked bad, committing three errors that led to six unearned runs. Lefty Chuck Stobbs gave up nine

hits but was never in serious trouble after Washington batted around for five runs in the fifth.

Detroit came up with four runs in the first inning against the slumping Orioles and Ned Garver never gave the Birds a chance to catch up.

An error by Bobby Young on a potential double-play ball opened the flood gates in the first. Young later homered for the only Baltimore run.

In Saturday's class B division, E. E. Driscoll and Nelson Reed, both local gun clubbers, placed first and second with their scores of 97 and 96 out of 100.

Sunday, Skeeters fired a neat perfect 99 out of a possible 100 targets to win the class A division. Eugene's Armstrong took second spot with his 98.
