

Eldorado Lumberjacks In Alturas

Alturas will be the destination of the Eldorado Lumberjacks tomorrow afternoon as the second round of the California - Oregon Semi-pro baseball league arrives.

The Lumberjacks have already played the Alturas team, and were beaten by a 17-2 score in the season opener for the Klamath Falls team.

Last week the 'Jacks turned on the power and belted the Lakeview Gems right out of the ball park by a 35-5 score in a free hitting seven inning contest.

Leaders in last week's assault, and some who will be expected to carry the load for the invading Lumberjack nine are Fran Miller, who will get the pitching assignment, and who also packs a wicked bat to the plate. Gary Dawes, Manager Hi Hatfield, and Art Raymond.

Hatfield will start Miller against the Alturas crew, with steady Ron Owings filling the catching position without much trouble.

The Eldorado infield will consist of Raymond at first base, Gene Mettler covering second and Don Dexter holding down the third base position. Joe Kim will get the call for shortstop in tomorrow's game.

Hatfield, along with Dawes and Irv Whitt or Dick Lundsten will be in the Klamath outfield in what could be a very important game for both of the ballclubs.

Whitt injured his ankle recently and if he is not ready for the Alturas game, Lundsten will get Hatfield's call for right field.

Lundsten will also be used in case Miller has any trouble on the mound against the Braves.

Monday, the Lumberjacks will play a Memorial Day game against Hill of the Northern California League. The ball game will get underway at 1:30 Monday afternoon, and the price of admission is 50 cents for anyone over 12. Children under 12 will be admitted free, according to Hatfield.

Spokane Lands In Red

The Western International League had another problem on its hands Saturday as president Roy Hotchkiss of the Spokane Indians turned over his team to the league with a splash of red ink.

Hotchkiss announced late Friday night poor attendance and his own poor health were forcing him to give up the Indians. He told the league that as of Saturday the Spokane team was his baby.

Hotchkiss, who was hospitalized with a heart attack earlier this year, said there was an "obvious lack of interest in the ball club by the fans of Spokane, the resulting lack of attendance, and the poor backing given our preseason ticket book drive."

The Spokane situation closely paralleled that of Calgary, which dropped back on the league at the start of the season because of financial problems. The league got Calgary's books back in order and new backing, however, and the Stampede rejoined the circuit.

Bob Abel of Tacoma, president of the WIL, was not available for comment.

As if it were under Hotchkiss' announcement, the Indians dropped their 18th game of the season Friday night, bowing before Yakima, 9-1.

Vanover, out in front of the pack by three full games, chalked up its 20th win of the season by chopping down Calgary, 20 - 3. The Edmondton Eskimos exploded for five runs in the sixth inning on three singles, a double, a walk, a brace of Victoria errors and a hit batsman to drop the Tyees. Whitey Thomson and Vern Campbell both homered for the Eskimos.

The Tri-City Braves made their last inning a winning one in their victory over Salem. The Braves cracked the game wide open with three runs aided by doubles by Bob Moniz and Des Charouhas. Gene Tansell and Harvey Storey both homered for Salem.

Women's Softball Organized

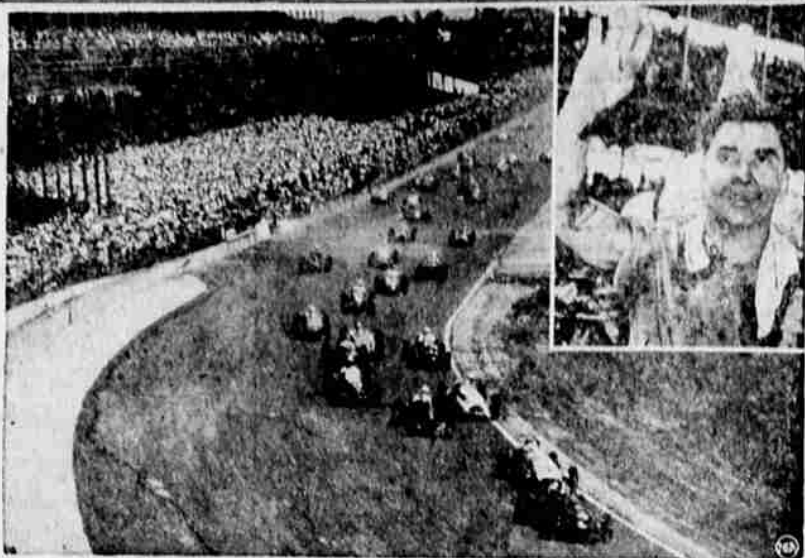
Five teams were represented in last night's meeting of the Women's Softball League and over 30 more girls have signed up to play in the summer league, according to Bob Bonney, city recreation director.

INDIANAPOLIS (NEA) — A recruit hasn't roared home the winner of the Indianapolis Speedway 500 since Frank Lockart took the jackpot way back in 1926.

But throughout Indiana—where everybody who uses a car for anything more than a Sunday drive is awaiting the big grind of May 31—they give a 20-year-old North Vernon novice a solid chance of turning the trick.

That would be Pat O'Connor, who will take his place along with 14 veteran drivers in the first five rows of the 33-car field.

O'Connor has been driving for six years, which is the Speedway equivalent of a grammar school background, but he is entering the big test with a lot of faith in himself.

"I got a lot of car to handle and I've won my share of races," he says. "Don't see any reason why I don't have as much chance as the next guy."

This kind of confidence in a rookie only can come from a well-qualified one, and O'Connor appears to be all of that and then some. The Flying Irishman started in roadster events around Columbus, Ind., in 1948 and last summer captured the American Automobile Association's midwest sprint crown.

O'Connor will be at the wheel of a Kurtis Kraft of the 500-C series. The car is owned by Lindsey Hopkins of Miami, Fla., and the way in which O'Connor was able to come across a car of this class is a fine illustration of the part casual luck plays in automobile racing.

O'Connor, with two fairly successful seasons on AAA dirt and high bank tracks around Indiana and Ohio, came to Indianapolis last year with an eye on the 500. He passed his driver's test in a six-year-old front-drive car, but couldn't make it run fast enough for any qualifying attempt.

"So I shopped around the garage area for a couple of days, looking to see if I could latch onto a break or something like that—namely, a fast car," he explains. "I came up with a rear-drive car, a Brown Special."
