Lake Pomona Grange Meets

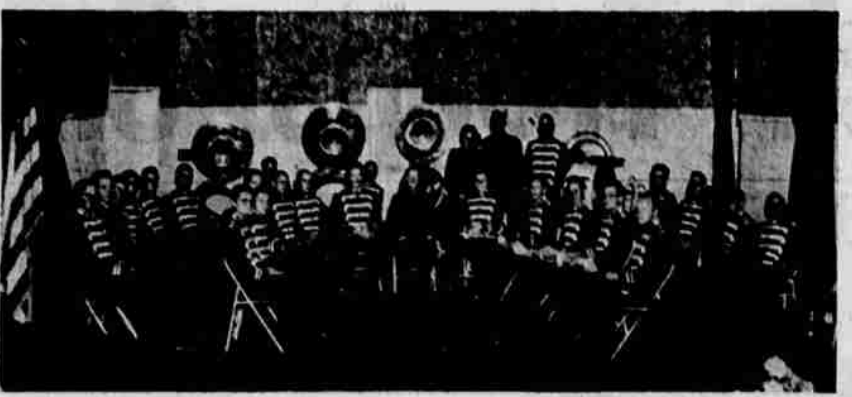
PAISLEY—Lake County Pomona Grange met in regular session Saturday, May 29, at the west side grange hall, Pomona master, Raymond Johnson presided.

Marines Form Klamath Unit

Staff Sergeant William M. Allen, of the local Marine Corps Recruiting Station, has announced the tentative list of KUIS men, graduating in June, who have made application to join the Marine Corps as part of the "Pelican Leather Neck." The unit will leave Klamath Falls, enroute to Portland via the Shasta Daylight on June 6.

The list includes James E. Pugh, Stanley W. Kuhlman, Carl D. Stewart, William D. Jacobs, Walter H. Sweek, John R. Gritman, Jack T. Henry, Jack W. Ryder, James B. Pitts and James H. Anderson. These ten men will be accompanied by two 1953 graduates of Klamath Union High School. They are Rodney D. Klus and Ronald D. Wise. More names may be added, Sgt. Allen said.

Plans call for the men to arrive in Portland on the night of the 6th, take physicals and tests on the 7th, and be sworn in the Marines on the 8th and flown to San Diego, California on that date.

Although the unit is composed of only Klamath Falls men, Sgt. Allen also invites inquiries from men from other parts of the Klamath Basin, and to enlist as part of this "elite" unit. They will train together while in "boot camp".

Sgt. Allen also stressed that the opportunity to enlist in Marine Corps Reserve and serve for two years active duty will end on June 30. After that date, men will be able to enlist only for three or four years.

Lions Club Institute Planned

The sixth annual institute for parents of pre-school visually handicapped children, jointly sponsored by the Oregon Lions Club Auxiliary and the Oregon state school for the blind at Salem, will be held June 4 to 11 on the blind school campus, according to Mrs. Clarence A. Humble, Klamath Falls, auxiliary president.

During the sessions, which are aimed at helping parents adjust to their child's handicap and, in turn, to help the child adjust to his sightless world, parents and children are housed in the school dormitories, eat in the school cafeteria, and are even provided with a diaper service for the very young babies. There is no expense involved to the parent, as the Oregon Lions Club Auxiliary adopted the institute as their state-wide project in 1950 and have since that time supported it financially.

Aside from the financial support, the auxiliary members act as babysitters for the children, leaving the parents free to absorb the instruction arranged for them, including special lectures, classes and panel discussions.

Speakers on the program include many outstanding authorities in all phases of child guidance, as well as parents who have previously attended and benefited from the institute. Also on the program, will be several former students of the blind school who have achieved success despite their handicap.

"The importance of the institute cannot be over-emphasized," Mrs. Humble explains. One has only to see the parents and their tenseness on the first day of their arrival and then note the more relaxed attitude with which they depart, to realize it. But better still, the progress of the youngsters from year to year is gratifying proof."

Fifty-two families, from over 20 different Oregon counties, were represented at last year's sessions, including 47 mothers, 30 fathers, 4 grandmothers, and 70 children, some of these brothers and sisters with sight who could not be left at home. An even larger attendance is expected this year, according to Walter H. Dry, superintendent of the state school for the blind, and Mollie Vlasnik, counselor for the institute.

The session will get under way Friday, with registrations taking place throughout the day, and a get-acquainted hour at 8 p.m.
