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Socialists Urge Works Program
 PHILADELPHIA (AP) — The latest platform of the Socialist party features a multi-billion dollar government program of public works. The policy platform was presented to the 29th National Convention yesterday by Mayor Frank Zeidler of Milwaukee.

It said the Republican administration program falls short of the nation's needs and charges the Democrats with abdicating the responsibilities of an opposition party. Among other planks in the platform:

1. Increase in the basic income tax exemptions and abolition of excise taxes on necessities.
2. Lifting the housing program from its "present emphasis on guaranteeing profits for... money lenders to one of guaranteeing homes for people."
3. Increase in farm subsidies.

Sailor Held For Murder Of Wave

LEONARDTOWN, Md. (AP) — Authorities planned a new search today for a pair of bloodied trousers which they say a Navy airman discarded after murdering a Navy Wave.

They said their prisoner—Airman Carl Willis Strickland, 21—would accompany them on their tour of the Scotland Beach area. Strickland is due to appear in Magistrate's court Friday on a murder charge.

The young sailor insisted that he left the Wave, Irene Marion Conole, 26, of Rochester, N.Y., alive with an unnamed hitchhiker early Saturday on the beach near Point Lookout, Md., after spending the evening with her.

Her body—the head and face wounded in about a dozen places—was discovered half submerged in Chesapeake Bay early Saturday. Authorities attributed the death to drowning.

St. Mary's County Sheriff Willard B. Long said he thinks Strickland disposed of his trousers, Miss Conole's purse and two beach blankets somewhere between Scotland Beach and Patuxent Naval Station.

Both were stationed at Patuxent. A tour of this area was made yesterday, but none of the items was found.

Strickland was arrested at his home in Rocky Mount, N.C., Saturday afternoon and returned to Leonardtown jail yesterday. His wife of one year, Wanda, made the trip back with him.

Rocky Mount Detective Lt. P.C. Zimmerman, who arrested Strickland, said the young airman gave him this version of his date with Miss Conole:

Returning home after visiting several night spots, they picked up a hitchhiker at Miss Conole's request. The three then proceeded to Hay's Beach, near Point Lookout.

Later, Strickland left the two together. When he found her purse in his car he returned to the beach, only to find bloodied blankets.

Japan Slavery Said Ended

TOKYO (AP) — A farm village once known as a brisk market for the sale of boys and girls has given up the practice and has become a model farming community, the Japan Daily News reports.

Farmers in Hiraishi Village, Ibaraki Prefecture, in the past frequently bought boys and girls from their parents and used their purchases as a cheap form of farm labor. Going price for a strong boy was reported to be 3,000 yen or \$42 according to present dollar-yen exchange rates.

Authorities in 1948 estimated that there were at least 70 boys and girls who were living out a period of virtual slavery at Hiraishi as the result of their having been sold by their impoverished parents. The period of service for the boys ended only with their conscription into the army.

Since 1948 the practice has gradually been ended.

Court Rules On Land Sale

PORTLAND (AP) — Another court ruling added complications Friday to the legal snarl touched off three years ago by the unlawful sale of 800 acres of Indian trust timber lands.

Acting Circuit Judge Franklin Howell awarded Henry B. Taylor and his wife, Elizabeth, of The Dalles, \$64,484—all that was left of the \$133,000 which they paid two Indians for the property.

The Indians, Jasper Grant and Harold Thornton, have spent the rest—more than \$70,000.

An earlier court ruling voided the transaction and directed that the Taylors return the property to the two Indians. The Taylors were suing for the return of the money they had paid for it.

Three men, Clyde W. Plinn, John C. Blanford and Fred M. Marsh, were sentenced to prison for their parts in the fraudulent sale.

Thailand Asks U.N. Action

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP) — Thailand asked Saturday that the U. N. Security Council meet and send observers to Southeast Asia because of the war in Indochina.

Thanasak Khamon, Thailand's permanent representative to the U. N., said in a letter to Sir Pierson Dixon of Britain, president of the 11-nation council for this month:

"Large scale fighting has repeatedly taken place in the immediate vicinity of Thai territory; there is in the view of my government a possibility of direct incursions of foreign troops into its territory."

"I have the honor to bring this situation to the attention of the Security Council to the end that the Security Council may provide for observation under the peace observation commission."

Junior Red Cross Displays Activities At Open House

Activities of local schools in Junior Red Cross, were displayed at the chapter headquarters Tuesday afternoon, May 25 at an open house honoring teacher sponsors who served the past year.

Mrs. Bennet poured. Committee members assisting at the open house, included Mrs. C. R. Canine and Mrs. Frank Fleet. Guests were welcomed by Mrs. Moore. Refreshments were donated by committee members.

In addition to service to local and veterans hospitals and institutions in our country, Junior Red Cross members have contributed gift boxes for Korean relief. All boxes turned in at the end of this year become part of a 100,000 gift box shipment to Korean children.

The national childrens fund of the Red Cross is also providing 1,151,000 pencils, 600,000 copybooks, 3500 dozen suits of warm underwear, 3,500 dozen childrens sweat shirts and 1,000 school assistance units.

Each of the units is packed in a cabinet-like shipping case, containing tools, reference books, first aid and health items, classroom and recreational equipment. Total value of the Junior Red Cross assistance to Korean childrens relief is \$460,000.00. The program is made possible by contributions from the school children of the United States through their membership in Junior Red Cross.

Chinese Sentenced To Death By Reds

HONG KONG (AP) — Communist Chinese authorities in Hunan Province have sentenced 12 persons to death in the roundup of an anti-Red organization, a pro-nationalist Chinese newspaper here reported today. It said 11 others were sent to prison for life.

The Kung Sheng Daily News, quoting a dispatch from a Hunan paper, said 109 persons were arrested in the roundup last April of the group, called the China New Socialist party.
