Alturas Dumps Lumberjacks 15-5

Alturas' powerful semi-pro ball club loomed up in the Eldorado Lumberjacks yesterday afternoon with a heavy hitting attack that set the 'Jacks down to a 15-5 defeat.

The Braves opened the scoring first as they jumped on Klamath's starting pitcher, Fran Miller and his reliever Ron Wright for six hits and seven runs in the first inning. Five errors against the Lumberjacks also helped the Alturas cause.

Alturas scored twice in the fourth and twice more in the fifth, of two hits in each inning. Two base on balls and a two run homer by Gordy Robertson highlighted the third inning's action for the home team.

Robertson's second home run of the afternoon came in the sixth inning with two men on, and the hit happy Braves went on to conquer twice in the seventh and once more in the last of the eighth frame.

For the Lumberjacks, all five runs were scored in the sixth and seventh innings of the California-Oregon League ball game.

In the sixth, Gene Meiler was safe on an error, Don Dexter doubled, Gary Dawes was safe on another, Alturas' bobble and Art Raymond's two base hit accounted for the three Klamath tallies.

Dick Pepple and Al Herrera were safe on errors to lead off the seventh inning and with one away, Dexter binned out a long triple to score both of the base runners.

Miller and Art Raymond led the Lumberjacks at the plate in collecting three for five and two for four respectively, Dexter had a double and his triple, while Raymond got a two base hit.

Alturas was led by Robertson with three hits in four times at bat, and Bob Poole who collected three safeties in six tries for the Braves.

Southern Cal Wins PCC Track Title

SEATTLE (AP) — Southern California's potent Trojans led the Bears from Berkeley dream for about an hour Saturday, then came with a rush to wrap up their 14th consecutive Pacific Coast Conference track and field championship.

Four records were set in the 2-day meet, two of them by the men of Troy as they stacked up 10 points and left California's Bears trailing in second with 49. Stanford was third with 33 1/2 and the rest of the field scrambled for the crumbs.

Washington State tallied 16, UCLA 15, Oregon 13 1/2, Washington 13, Oregon State 7 and Idaho 4.

Ernie Shelton of USC raised the conference high jump record by an eighth of an inch when he skinned the bar at 6 feet 9 1/2 inches. Troy's Joe Grafias had set a record of 9 1/2 seconds in the 100-yard dash in Friday's prelims, but the wind slowed him to 9 7/8 seconds Saturday.

Stanford's Leo Long sailed the javelin 235 feet 9 1/2 inches, better his own spear record and Denny Meyer of Washington was clocked in 9:09.1 for a new mark in the 2-mile.

Bob Gary of Washington State was high jumper with 9, winning the 220 and coming close to a dead heat with Grafino in the 100. A dead heat did develop in the high hurdles when Will Wright of USC closed fast to tie with Gerry Wood of Stanford.

Southern Cal captured five first places and was shut out in only two events, the javelin and low hurdles. But the Trojans picked off three of the available five places in two other events, the 220 and the discus.

This big cluster of points came when California was leading Troy, 33 to 26 1/2. After the discus and 220 reports came in, USC bounced ahead, 47 1/2 to 36.

Winners of the first three places in each event, with some additions to take care of the relays, were named to the conference team which will meet the Big 10 June 15 at Evanston, Ill.

Clarence S. (Hec) Edmundson, who is retiring after 35 years as track coach at Washington, was picked by his fellow coaches to direct the team in the annual clash with the Big 10.

Campanella wasn't much help at the plate yesterday as the Dodgers took the rubber of the three-game series with the Giants 5-2 before the National League season's largest crowd—47,672 fans—going hitless in four times at bat. He grounded out three times and went out on a long fly in his other time at bat. The veteran receiver, however, did a fine job behind the plate, handling the shots of young speedballer Johnny Podres with his usual deftness.

"I swung real hard only once," he said. "That was the time I hit that long drive to right field. And the hand didn't hurt a bit. It still feels sensitive but that is because of the nerves that had to be separated when the operation was performed."

Not even his sub-par 150 batting average failed to dim his spirits.

Except for the use of a sponge in his catching mitt and a plain doeking glove while batting, Campanella gave no concession to his healing hand. League President Warren Giles had given Campanella special permission to wear the glove.

NEW YORK (AP) — "I'm back to stay. I'm gonna catch every day from now on."

Roy Campanella, his left hand hanging loosely in the whirlpool, used his right to knock on wood as he said that.

"I felt fine out there today," the slugger Brooklyn Dodger catcher said enthusiastically. "The hand didn't hurt me a bit. Maybe I didn't get any hits but I'm not worried about it. I'm still rusty from not playing. It was the first time I batted in a month."

It was exactly 29 days ago May 1—that Campanella left the club in Cincinnati to undergo an operation for the removal of a bone chip in his left hand. The operation took place in New York May 3 before the Dodgers' star had been out of the lineup ever since.

"It was like old times being out there behind the plate again," he said happily. "You've got no idea how miserable I felt sitting on the sidelines all this time."

Owens Captures A-Main

Gem Speedway's first evening hardtop racing program got off to a bangy start last night, both for the fans and the hardtop drivers as there were several nip and tuck finishes and quite a few exciting pileups.

Wes Owens put on a good showing in his K-16 to win the main event ahead of second place Russ Newell in K-15.

Al Rossi took the lead in the A-main after eight laps had been run, but about three fourths the way through the 25 lap event Rossi's K-12 spun out and Owens and Newell took the lead spots for keeps.

Bernie Miller finished behind Newell in M-5 and Jerry Johnson was fourth in his C-9 hardtop.

In the B-main, which was one of the wildest shows of the season, Allen Bousman's K-25 took first and Frank Johnson in C-9 was second. Third went to Ray Brackman in his K-22.

In a restart after 10 laps had been completed, Bousman was on the pole and Brackman had the outside leading position. In the following laps Bousman hung to the corners to assure him the first place spot, while Brackman and Johnson put on a fight for second position.

In the first of two C-races, Don Barron placed first ahead of Ken Kime and Wally Cannon. Vick Flackus took fourth place money.

Barron's K-28 went over the north turn in the early part of the race, but he came back and took advantage of a couple of restarts to put him in contention for top honors. This was the first time that Barron has raced in a hardtop, and he did so only because his brother, Ed, was unable to drive in the evening show.

The second C race was won by Wes Bishop in K-10. Second place went to A-10 driven by Monte Hall, from Astland, third position went to Harold Rummels in K-55, while Don Harris was taking fourth spot in his K-19.

Miller tried to make it a clean sweep in last night's program as he took top places in both the trophy dash and the final heat after he won the fourth heat race.

The Medford car took the lead in the final heat and held it for the ten lap event, while John Hittso K-7 and Rusty Phillips C-2 combined for second and third places. Fourth spot went to Bousman in his K-25.

In the trophy event Miller and Matt Christian in K-84 put on a battle with the M-5 hardtop coming out on top. Third and fourth place prize money went to Pee Wee Roufs in K-50 and Bousman in K-25.

The four heat races opened the first evening show of the season with a banner of thrills as Bousman took the first heat ahead of Neil Mayfield in K-14 and Jerry Johnson in C-6.

In the wild second heat, Pee Wee Roufs finished first and Ivy Schultz second. Third went to Ben Morrison in K-8 and fourth was nabbed by K-1 with Dale Hankins at the wheel.

The third and fourth heat races were won by Christian in K-84 and Miller in M-5. Second spot in the number three heat went to Wilbur McGilvery in M-14 and Ed Roufs took fourth spot in K-12.

Jack Lively in K-87 nailed down second spot in the final heat race, while third and fourth spots went to Hittson and Curt Davis in K-7 and K-21.

Larry Goetz Makes Refreshing Statement

NEW YORK (AP) — The most refreshing statement of the current baseball season is that attributed to Umpire Larry Goetz of the National League after a mix-up between his fellow arbiters on a decision in a game between Chicago and St. Louis. The forthright Goetz said it was "fussy umpiring," and expressed his regrets.

The average fan, we suggest, would be much more inclined to respect and even like umpires if the hirings in blue were permitted mistakes. We predict, further, that the first of them who tells the press after a game that "I blew a couple today, boys," will become famous. Goetz is just one who might do it, too.

Any of the contending clubs which hope to sneak some "penance insurance" out of the opposite league—a maneuver made somewhat notorious by the Yankees in recent seasons—will have to act soon. The new "Greenberg Rule," named for its sponsor, General Manager Hank Greenberg of the Cleveland Indians, will put a crimp in such activities after it goes into effect June 15.

From that point on it will not be enough to get a player waived out of his own league in order to sell him to a contending club in the other league, as was done, for recent example, when the St. Louis Cards bought Vic Raschi from the Yankees this spring. Under the new law such a "castoff" from the American League would have to be turned down by all the clubs in the National in ascending order, beginning with the last place Pittsburgh Pirates, before he could be dealt to the Cards.

And, speaking of the Yankees, there is additional evidence that their rivals in the American League, while not necessarily engaging in a "stop the Yanks" campaign, are not consciously doing anything to help the five-time world champions, either.

The recent deal in which the Boston Red Sox sent third baseman George Kell to the sizzling Chicago White Sox actually was agreed upon some days before the official announcement was made.

FORT WORTH, Tex. (AP) — Johnny Palmer added \$5,000 to his bank account and looked toward the Western Open at Cincinnati Monday as they toasted him at Colonial Country Club for a great finish that gave him first place in the Colonial National Invitation Golf Tournament.

Brooklyn bested New York, 5-3, the Phils dumped the Pirates twice, 8-0 and 10-7 and Chicago split two with Cincinnati. Erault Stops Leaders

San Diego pitcher Eddie Erault proved the Hollywood Stars aren't invincible, but it remained questionable Monday if many other hurlers in the Pacific Coast League have the stuff to make it a close race.

The righthanded Padre veteran snapped a 10-game Hollywood win streak Sunday as he blanked the league leaders on two hits 4-0.

Oakland split with Sacramento, winning 7-4 and then losing 9-6, while Los Angeles beat Portland 10-5 and then lost 3-2 in a pair of extra innings.

San Francisco's Seals are 7 1/2 games behind Hollywood while Seattle, Los Angeles, San Diego and Sacramento all are tied one game further back.

Monday's doubleheaders show Sacramento at Hollywood, Oakland at San Diego, Portland at San Francisco and Los Angeles at Seattle.

At Seattle, Artie Wilson's single in the sixth was the only hit off Ken Holcomb in the seven-inning nightcap.

At Lyons belted a grand slam home run in the fourth inning to put San Francisco out of reach in the first game. The double victory made it 18 in the past 23 games for the rampaging Seals.

Fred Richards started Los Angeles toward the first game win with a three-run homer, his 12th of the season. The Angels added six runs in the seventh and tied Bruce Edwards' two-run double and two errors by Portland first baseman Hank Arft. Joe Hatten gave up 13 hits but emerged the winner.

Portland pushed across the winning run in the last of the ninth inning of the second game on singles by Rocky Kramich and Dino Restelli. The Beavers had tied the count at 2-2 in the seventh on Kramich's home run with Don Egbert aboard.
