### Benson Backs Farm Program

**ST. LOUIS** — Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson Tuesday described the administration's proposed program of flexible farm price supports as one "that will be sound for farmers in the short-run and in the long-run."

"The present program of rigid supports 'taxes the American people for abundance only to deny them the full benefits of abundance,'" he said in a speech prepared for a meeting of the St. Louis Chamber of Commerce.

Benson said he will not heed the warning of some that the administration's program is poor politics.

"There should be no room for narrow partisan prejudices in this question," he said. "We are dealing with something that affects the welfare of all farmers — of all business — of all working people — of all consumers."

The secretary said there is nothing new about flexible price supports and that they have been a part of the government's farm program for many years.
