CCC Announces Sales Plan,

CCC Announces Sales Plan,
Prices For Surplus Seeds

Commodity Credit Corporation sales plans for hay and pasture seeds announced May 21, h a ve been received by W. W. Thompson, chairman of the Klamath Alsike Clover Seed Growers Committee, a c e g r d in g to Walt Jendreejewaki, county extension agent. A sales list is scheduled for release early in June.

About one half of the CCC owned stocks of certain forage crop seeds will be offered for sale to the domestic seed trade during the month of June in lots of not less than 20,000 pounds or the total quantity at a given location.

Minimum price for acceptance of competitive bids on 960,000 pounds of alsike clover seed to be offered in June is 20 cents per pound for seed of basic specifications.

After the June sale alsike seed will be sold by Commodity Stabilization Service offices at prices announced each month by the USDA. However, no sales of alsike for domestic use will be made below a 25 cent per pound minimum price for the period July 1 1954 to June 30, 1955.
