CCC Announces Sales Plan, Prices For Surplus Seeds

Commodity Credit Corporation plans for hay and pasture seeds announced May 21, have been received by W. W. Thompson, chairman of the Klamath Alaska Clover Seed Growers Committee, according to Walt Jendrzewski, county extension agent. A sales list is scheduled for release early in June.

About one half of the CCC owned stocks of certain forage crop seeds will be offered for sale to the domestic seed trade during the month of June in lots of not less than 20,000 pounds or the total quantity at a given location.

Minimum price for acceptance of competitive bids on 900,000 pounds of alsike clover seed to be offered in June is 20 cents per pound for seed of basic specifications.

After the June sale alsike seed will be sold by Commodity Stabilization Service offices at prices announced each month by the USDA. However, no sales of alsike for domestic use will be made below a 25 cent per pound minimum price for the period July 1, 1954 to June 30, 1955.

Other crop seeds offered for sale are listed together with quantity offered and minimum prices for the June sale and later.

Alfalfa, common, northern, 9,750,000 pounds, 30 and 35 cents; alfalfa, common, central, 1,350,000 pounds, 29 to 30 cents.

Certified alfalfas: Ranger, 4,400,000 pounds; Ladak, 440,000 pounds; Grimm, 270,000 pounds; Buffalo, 2,150,000 pounds; Atlantic, 310,000 pounds. Minimum price of these certified alfalfas for the June sale is 35 cents. Minimum price for later sales is 40 cents.

Ladino clover, two million pounds, 47 and 55 cents; Red clover, 3,900,000 pounds, 30 and 35 cents; Sweet clover, 500,000 pounds, 9.45 and 10 cents; Tall Fescue, common, 1,750,000 pounds, 17 and 20 cents; Certified, 4,600,000 pounds, 19 and 22 cents.

Klamath's alsike clover seed committee together with Tulelake alsike growers cooperated in an effort to secure quota regulations for imports of alsike clover seed. This effort resulted in a hearing before the Tariff Commission in Washington, D.C., last February.

Imports of alsike seed at the present two cent per pound tariff increased from 93,000 pounds in 1951 to 4,144,500 pounds in 1952. Imports from Canada's 1953 crop totaled 4,651,500 pounds on April 30, 1954.

The committee was advised recently by Senator Guy Cordon that the Tariff Commissions report has been forwarded to the White House.

District Judge Geddes Passes
