U.S. Sends Honduras Aid

TEGUCIGALPA, Honduras (AP) — The United States stepped up military aid Wednesday to Honduras, southern neighbor of Communist-influenced Guatemala and a potential ally in blocking any Red move toward the Panama Canal.

U. S. Army Col. M. C. Shattuck, chief of the U. S. military mission in Honduras, lined up a training program for officers of a new 800-man combat battalion to be whipped into shape.

The Honduran war minister, Gen. Leonidas Pineda, announced the United States is sending more arms and tanks for the outfit.

Shattuck said his staff would begin training officers and non-coms for the battalion at once.

Pineda said the additional arms are en route here by ship to supplement weapons airlifted from the United States last week after it was learned Guatemala was getting arms from behind the Iron Curtain.
