

State Hunters Bag Record Number Of Deer In 1953

Oregon's big game hunters broke all previous state records in bagging 105,601 deer during the 1953 hunting season, according to figures compiled by R. U. Mace, big game chief for the Oregon State Game Commission. Of the 196,351 hunters participating, over half were successful in bagging a deer, with bucks representing 64 per cent of the total kill.

Lake county led with a kill of 8,489 deer, followed by Klamath, Grant, Lane, Crook, Deschutes, and Harney counties. Mule deer bagged east of the Cascades made up approximately two-thirds of the total kill, the remainder being blacktails from western Oregon. The greatest number of deer were killed on the opening week end of the hunter's choice season when over one-third of the total was taken, but the first two days of the season resulted in a high kill also.

Elk hunters exceeded in number that of any previous year except 1951 with 25,576 tagholders participating. A grand total of 4,145 elk was killed, with 165 of those taken during the three controlled seasons. Highest success was had in northeastern Oregon where 17 per cent of the hunters filled their tags. By comparison, hunters in western Oregon had a 10 per cent success with a total of 673 bulls, taken mostly in Clatsop and Coos counties, Union, Wallowa, Grant, and Umatilla Counties of eastern Oregon provided the best hunting, and bulls made up 85 per cent of the total kill.

Pronghorned antelope hunters were 474 per cent successful in the open portions of Lake, Harney, and Malheur counties. There a total of 380 hunters took 181 animals. A comparison of the buck kill since 1948 when a measurement of the deer harvest first became possible shows that the 1953 bag of 67,539 bucks exceeds that of previous years by a wide margin. The annual buck kill from 1948 through 1952 varied from 29,785 to 57,260, averaging 36,056. In 1953, the 5-year average was exceeded by over 17,000 bucks. The total deer kill for 1953 exceeded that of 1952, the second highest year on record, when similar hunting seasons, including a hunter's choice, resulted in the harvest of 77,639 deer.

U. S. Holds Talks With Arabs, Jews

WASHINGTON (AP)—Eric Johnston, President Eisenhower's special emissary, will try again this month to bring the Arabs and Jews into harmony on a plan to develop the Jordan River Valley. State Department officials said last night Johnston has arranged a new series of conferences in the Middle East with representatives of Syria, Lebanon, Jordan, Egypt and Israel. He will leave Washington about June 10 and arrive in Cairo June 12, where conferences will be held with the Arab nations. He plans to confer with Israeli representatives later in Tel Aviv.
