Trappers Take In State Told

Pelt returns show that Oregon trappers were enriched by over \$181,200 for their efforts during the 1953-54 trapping season, according to figures compiled by C. E. Kebbe, chief of furbearers for the Oregon State Game Commission. A total of 79,744 pelts were taken during this period by 1,163 trappers.

The big four among furbearers was the muskrat, beaver, mink and otter.

Muskrafs were taken in the greatest numbers with over 63,000 pelts harvested, bringing a return to the trapper of \$46,658. The Klamath and Harney County marshlands provided the bulk of the muskrat catch.

Beaver proved to be the big gun of the four as far as returns were concerned. With an average price of \$8.48 per pelt, 11,103 beaver pelts brought a return of \$94,153 to the trapper. Lane, Douglas, and Clatsop Counties were tops for beaver production.

With a return of \$35,670, mink proved number three on the list in importance to the trapper. Trappers took 3,038 mink pelts during

the season which sold for an average price of \$11.97 per pelt. Again, Lane, Douglas, and Clatsop counties provided the best mink trapping.

Highest priced pelts were brought in by the otter, which sold for an average price of \$14.84 per pelt. However, only 162 of these valuable furbearers were taken, bringing to the trapper a little more than \$2,404.

Other animals taken by trappers include the coyote, raccoon, weasel, gray and red fox, wildcat, badger, opossum, and the lowly skunk and civet cat.

The two stars are co-starring in "The Conqueror," and Wayne was wryly observing one of the phenomena of Hollywood. Sometimes a star becomes hot news. Then he or she becomes the focus of attention for Hollywood correspondents.

Last year it was Wayne, who was embroiled in a divorce suit with his wife Chela. Now it is

Miss Hayward, who is fighting litigation of almost equal intensity involving her husband Jess Barker.

The divorce trial is set for June 14. Miss Hayward replied in answer to my query: "I will fly down from the location in Utah."

Will it be a one-day affair?

"Oh, no. The calendar is set for four days. Everything is going to be brought out. It's too bad. This whole thing could have been resolved very easily with a settlement. But it's too late for that now."

Miss Hayward indicates she will fight the affair to what may well be the bitter end. She is taking her twin sons to the location with her and says she will refuse to allow them to be brought into open court to watch the proceedings.

Navy Tests New 'Pogo' Plane

MOFFETT FIELD, Calif. (P)—The Navy unveiled its Flying Pogo Stick yesterday in the first public demonstration of a vertical takeoff by a wing-type plane.

The delta-wing craft made a tethered flight inside the Navy's huge hangar once used for dirigibles.

Test pilot J. P. (Skeets) Coleman took the Convair XPY1 up three times and landed vertically. Safety cables prevented him from turning it into its standard horizontal flight position. The experimental plane rose as high as 100 feet.

When the plane is fully developed, it will allow large vessels to carry their own air cover, and give infantrymen cover from small cleared spaces right behind the front lines.
