Testimony Heard By Bodinet Jury

A graphic description of a holdup at Myrtle's Place, Klamath Falls parlor house, was given from the witness stand Thursday by Paula Benton, alleged operator of the establishment, when she was called as the first witness in the trial of Raymond J. Bodinet, Portland brickmason, charged with armed robbery.

Mrs. Benton signed the complaint against Bodinet following the fatal shooting of Edwin Coyne, also of Portland, an alleged accomplice in the holdup.

The woman's testimony was almost continually interrupted by objections from Defense Attorney A. C. Yaden. He contended that under the facts set forth in the grand jury indictment against Bodinet, the prosecution had no right to show any participation by Coyne.

At one point during the argument between opposing counsel, Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg said that in his opinion the wrong witness was on the stand.

He told Anderson that if the prosecution wanted to show that Bodinet and Coyne were acting together, he should have called Elizabeth Caldwell, colored maid at the parlor house, as his first witness.

"It was Elizabeth Caldwell who let them in the front door," the judge added. "She should have been called first to show they came into the place together."

Between arguments by counsel, Mrs. Benton described how Bodinet and Coyne entered her room on the morning of January 8, ordered out of bed and then robbed her. The witness also described how the Caldwell woman was bound and gagged and left lying on the floor in the kitchen of the house.

Mrs. Benton then told how Bodinet and Coyne took her to the second floor where the alleged robbers entered the rooms of two girls, Mickey O'Neill and Terry Miller. She said they were bound and gagged.

At the noon recess, Mrs. Benton was still describing happenings in the parlor house which led up to the slaying of Coyne by City Policeman James O'Neal.

The state opened its case late Wednesday. Alderson and Yaden clashed during the defense attorney's opening statement over use of the word, "bawdyhouse." Alderson objected but Judge Vandenberg ruled against him.
