Irving also received word that the IWA union and Northwest Timber Company, Gibbs, Idaho, have extended their contract without a wage increase. There are 265 employees involved in the Idaho contract.

Refugees Flee Guatemala

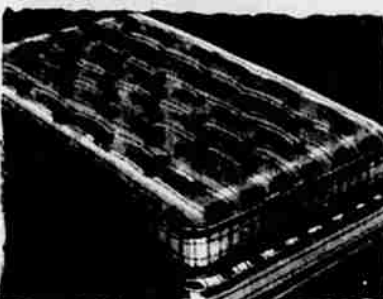

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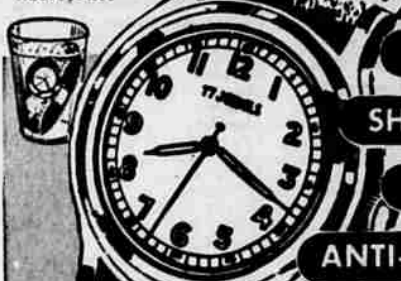
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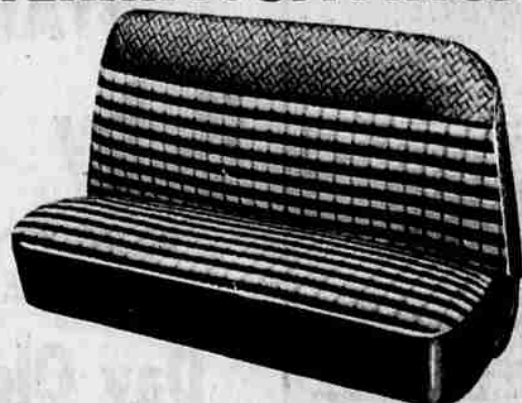
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
