WALL STREET
NEW YORK (U)—A higher stock market faltered Friday and then drifted lower into the late afternoon.

Minus signs predominated in the list with the changes running at the most to between 1 and 2 points.

Business was at the lowest ebb in around two months with volume estimated at 1,700,000 shares. That compares with 1,810,000 shares traded Thursday with the market rising.

Scientists Blast Ruling

WASHINGTON (U)—The Federation of American Scientists says the ruling against physicist J. Robert Oppenheimer stems from a security system "now motivated more by the risks of disclosure of information than by the risks of disclosure of information."

Describing as "unfair" a special inquiry board's 2-1 finding that Oppenheimer is a security risk, the federation said in a statement last night that the Atomic Energy Commission should conduct a review as Oppenheimer has asked.

"But beyond that," it said, "we urge strongly that the entire machinery of security must itself come under review."

"The American people are seeing samples of the mixing of politics and security in such highly publicized proceedings as the Army-McCarthy hearings."

"It is to be hoped that these hearings will attract attention to the underlying problem—the exploitation of legitimate concerns for national security for political ends."

The federation is a national organization of scientists formed in 1946 to act on public issues in its field.

Daylight Time Signers Needed

PORTLAND (U)—Sponsors of a daylight saving time petition expressed concern Friday over the apparent lack of progress in signature-gathering.

Junior Chamber of Commerce officials said only 9,000 signatures had been turned in here. More than 37,000 signatures are needed to put the daylight time measure on the November ballot.

Low Thompson, president of the Portland junior chamber, said, however, that only 5 per cent of the 8,500 petitions have been returned. He said he expected the rest to begin coming in soon.

Thompson said booths would be set up on Portland streets in the next two weeks to speed the collection of signatures.

Thompson noted that California has daylight time now, and that the junior chamber is sponsoring a ballot move for daylight time in Washington. He expressed fear that Oregon would be the only West Coast state to be on standard time next year, if the petitions fail.

Bodinet Jury Hears O'Neal Testimony

A dramatic account of the shooting of Edwin Coyle by City Police Officer James O'Neal during a hold-up at Myrtle's parlor house January 8 highlighted the testimony

Friday in the armed robbery trial of Raymond J. Bodinet, 31-year-old Portland brick mason.

Officer O'Neal, who shot Coyle in a hallway of the parlor house after four women had been bound and gagged, was on the witness stand when Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg called the noon recess. The judge said he probably would order a night session Friday.

Under direct examination by District Attorney Frank Alderson, Officer O'Neal told how he answered a disturbance call to the parlor house. When he saw Coyle with a gun in his hand, O'Neal said he ordered him to "stick 'em up."

"Coyle turned his head toward me," the policeman testified. "I said 'drop your gun!' He swung toward me with his gun in his hand. I drew my gun and fired. Coyle grabbed 'is chest, his knees buckled and he dropped. I ran to his side and twisted his gun out of his hand."

O'Neal then testified he saw Bodinet coming down a flight of stairs with his hands up.

"Bodinet shouted 'don't shoot, I'm not armed,' O'Neal continued. "Then he said to me: 'what

did you shoot him for? We're just a couple of poor fellows trying to get along. We've got families and all we wanted to do was get a little money.'"

During O'Neal's testimony, Defense Attorney A. C. Yaden interposed many objections. He contended that the account of the shooting of Coyle should not be admitted as evidence.

Before O'Neal took the stand, the jury heard an account of what transpired on the second floor of the parlor house just before the shooting from Mickey O'Neill, who described herself as a Portland beautician.

Miss O'Neill testified she was awakened by the alleged robbers in her second floor bedroom shortly before the shooting. She said she and two other girls were bound and gagged.

Miss O'Neill was preceded on the witness stand by Elizabeth Caldwell, maid in the parlor house. She told how she was bound and gagged by Bodinet. She freed herself and called police.

It is reported that a dozen more witnesses will be called before the case goes to the jury.

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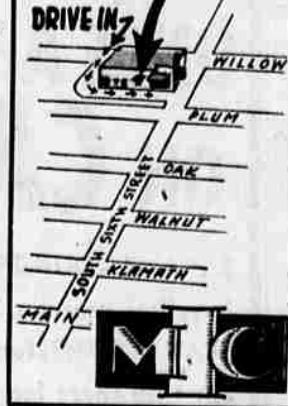
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
