The Davises live 20 miles west of Boston in the town of Framingham. Part of their home was built in 1690; and subsequent owners have added rooms and wings to the original historical structure resulting in a charming spacious home which Alice considers "just right" for the four Davises — they have two sons, Lyle, 12, and Jim, 10.

Alice spent her childhood in Klamath Falls; her mother, Mrs. Ruby Lyle owned the Hillsdale Hospital and by way of a surprise, Davis, who was coming west for a meeting in Yosemite Valley of the National Association of Comptrollers — he's executive comptroller of Jordan Marsh, one of the largest department stores in the world — made reservations for Alice.
