Leaves For Bay Region Home

San Francisco called—and Mrs. H. E. (Jennie) Peltz answered. After living in Klamath Falls for 47 years, since March 22, 1905, she left Sunday, May 30, to the Bay Area to make her home in the new Parkview Apartment, 310 Arballo Drive. She expects to be joined by her sister, Mrs. Frank Hirst, now in Florida who has spent some time here with Mrs. Peltz in past years.

With the late Mr. Peltz, she came to the West Coast from Pennsylvania. Upon arrival here Mr. Peltz became identified with the lumber industry, locating timber claims and timber homesteads.

Mrs. Peltz has long been active in the First Methodist Church, devoting a great deal of time to women's activities. She was a member of the Business and Professional Women's Club and of the Klamath Falls Library Club.

They brought the first automobile to Klamath County from Portland and bought gasoline in five gallon cans to run it.

Another "first" for the Peltzes — was building, owning and managing the first apartment house in Klamath Falls, built in 1906 at 534 Pine, and known as the Peltz Flats. After the couple sold it in about 1908, the structure has changed hands and names many times in the almost 50 intervening years — and today is known as the Bramhall Apartments.

They also built and owned the Empire Building, 534 Main here, and the Audley Apartments. The apartments were later sold to their only son, Harry Peltz Jr.

Mrs. Peltz made the trip south by car.
