



### Carol Moore Bride of Marvin Rose In Impressive Presbyterian Rites In Tulelake Community Church

TULELAKE — In one of the prettiest ceremonies of the spring, Carol Elizabeth Moore, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. W. Richard Moore, became the bride of Marvin Aaron Rose, at three o'clock, Sunday, May 16, in the Tulelake Community Presbyterian Church. The bridegroom is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Ivan Rose.

The service united two prominent Tulelake families. The double ring, candlelight ceremony, was read by the Rev. Marvin Keyser, in the presence of 300 guests and relatives of the young couple.

The lovely bride, given in marriage by her father, walked down the aisle between the pews marked with white silk altar rope, toward the altar, banked with tall baskets of white gladioli and woodwardia fern, before a background of white tapers in floor candelabra.

Mrs. Dave Bridges, Klamath Falls, sang "O Perfect Love," and "The Lord's Prayer," with Mrs. Marvin Keyser at the organ. Mrs. Keyser also played the traditional wedding marches.

The bridal gown of white slipper satin with court train, was made with a tiered overkirt of lace and nylon net. The lace was continued in points around the train and edged the double, fingertip length veil, caught with pearl encrusted tiaras. The lace points also edged the sheer net yoke. She carried two white orchids and a cascade of stephanotis blossoms on white satin ribbon on a white Rainbow Bible.

Her only jewels were a single strand of pearls, gift of the bridegroom.

Preceding the ceremony, the candlelighters, Johnelle Takacs, in floor length pink taffeta, made with bands of taffeta on pink net and Peter Pan collar, assisted Richard Moore Jr., brother of the bride, in lighting the altar candles.

Rose taffeta waist length frocks, made with tuck-trimmed bodices and hip lines were worn by the maid of honor Peggy Duckett, and bridesmaids, Lucille Ward, Tulelake, cousin of the bridegroom; and June Fields, University of California, the bride's roommate at college. All carried nosegays of wine colored carnations, centered

with pink roses and tied with pink satin ribbon. Their tiny flower caps matched the nosegays.

Two little flower girls, Diane Callas and Cheryl Rose, nieces of the bridegroom, in pink taffeta frocks, scattered pink rose petals on the white aisle cloth.

Dennis Moore, small brother of the bride, carried the rings on a white satin pillow.

Harry Rose, brother of the bridegroom, was best man. Ushers were French E. Johnson Jr., and Kenneth McLain.

The wedding party received in the church annex following the ceremony.

The four tiered wedding cake, encircled with pink rose buds and maidenhair fern and topped with white bells, centered a beautifully appointed table. The white cutwork cloth was draped over pink. Pink tapers in silver candelabra and silver coffee services were used.

Mrs. John Takacs served the cake after the new Mr. and Mrs. Rose cut the traditional first piece. Mrs. Harry Rose, sister-in-law of the bridegroom, was at the coffee urn. Mrs. Dean Callas, sister of the bridegroom, was at the punch bowl. Mrs. Jack Little (Sally Thomas) Berkeley, was in charge of the guest book.

Mrs. Durrell Waldin (Polly Haynes) and Nancy Young were at the gift table. Assisting about the rooms in formal frocks, were Marilyn Wilson, Ruth Gallovey and Mrs. Delbert Yordy.

For her daughter's wedding, Mrs. Moore, chose a teal blue lace afternoon frock, with boat neck, three-quarter sleeves, and full flared street-length skirt. Her small matching straw hat was rhinestone studded. Her shoulder flowers were deep pink rosebuds.

Mrs. Rose also wore lace in dusty pink with matching pink hat, black accessories and deep pink rose buds as a corsage.

Mrs. Blanche Brown-Banks, Berkeley, maternal grandmother of the bride, wore navy and white with a cluster of white carnations at the shoulder.

For traveling Mrs. Rose wore a beige linen dressmaker suit, matching hat, black accessories

and the orchids from her bridal arrangement at her shoulder. The honeymoon destination was not announced.

The bride attended the University of California, Berkeley. The bridegroom has been associated in farming interests with his father. A bridesmaid's luncheon at the bride's home was served the same day when Carol presented strands of small pearls to her attendants. Pink and white predominated, with flowering almonds centering the luncheon table and used about the rooms.

Mr. and Mrs. Hubert Wagers, who taught Ana River and Paisley schools this past year have been rehired for next year.

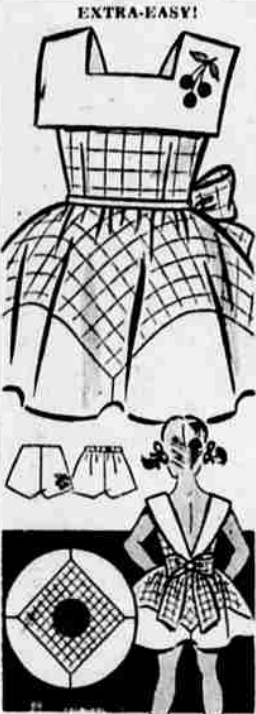
