Delta Kappa Gamma Organized 25 Years Ago

Delta Kappa Gamma, women teachers' honor society, was organized in Texas in 1929 by 13 prominent educators. Annie Webb Blanton was the originator of the plan and was a real inspiration to the organization.

At present there are 52 state and provincial chapters. These each have local chapters which make up a membership of more than 50,000 women.

The purposes of Delta Kappa Gamma are: (1) to unite women educators in a genuine spiritual fellowship; (2) to honor women who have given distinctive service in any field of education; (3) to protect the professional interests of women in education and eliminate unjust discrimination; (4) to sponsor and support desirable educational legislation and initiate legislation in the interests of women educators; (5) to endow scholarships to aid outstanding graduate study; (6) to initiate and develop a continuous program of teacher welfare designed to improve the economic, social and political status of women; (7) to inform the membership of current economic, social, political and educational issues to the end that they may become intelligent, functioning members of a world society.

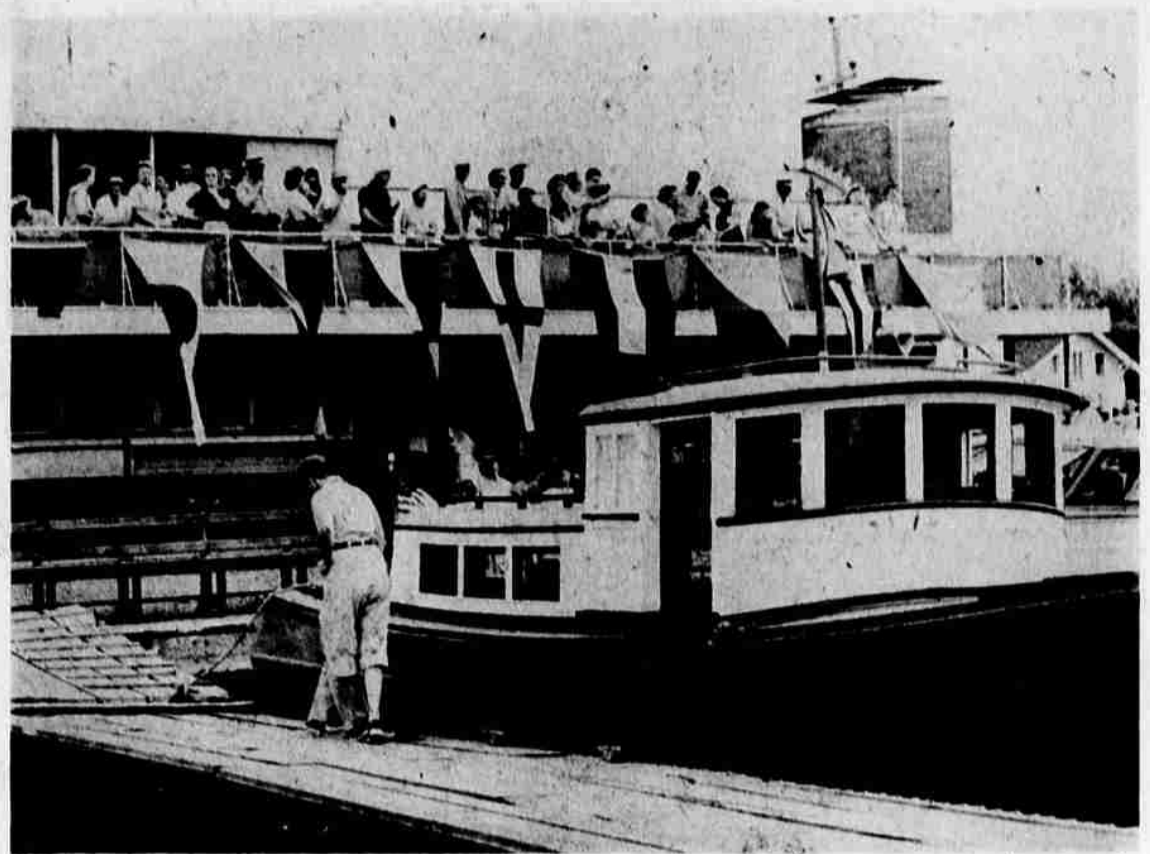
The membership is by invitation and a prospective member must have completed at least five years

of successful work in her educational field—teacher, supervisor, librarian.

After the membership quota of 10 percent of the women educators in a district has been reached, only two new members may be voted in each year.

Alpha Chapter, Alpha Rho State, of Delta Kappa Gamma was organized at Klamath Falls November 29, 1941. Mrs. Florence Ollmann and Mrs. Augusta Parker Dunbar, state founders; Mrs. Geraldine Owsley and Olive Wilson, state charter members; Mrs. Ida Edsall and Mrs. Irene Foster, chapter and charter members, were among those who helped to install this chapter. Women from Lake, Josephine and Jackson counties were also a part of Alpha Chapter. Later these three withdrew to form their own chapters. Alpha Chapter at present consists of 37 active members, one associate member, Mrs. Emorine Kappen, Macdoel, California, and one state honorary member, Mrs. Lucille O'Neill.

The chapter has given seven \$100 awards to girls who plan to make teaching a career. Recipients have been Helen Jackson Frye (three years), Winifred Guber (one year), Mary Ellen McCollin (two years). This year's recipient has not been named. In addition the chapter contrib-
