# Death Case Question Out

Inferences that city police "protection" houses of prostitution were ruled out of the testimony Saturday at the trial of Raymond J. Bodinet, 31-year-old Portland brick mason, charged with armed robbery.

Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg overruled Defense Counsel A. C. Yaden when the lawyer asked Police Chief Orville Hamilton how long he had known Paula Benton, Maude Hollingsworth, Blanche Dixon and Frances Watts, pouring the Oregon State Moose Association.

After District Attorney Frank Alderson objected to the question to Chief Hamilton, Judge Vandenberg asked Yaden what was the purpose of the query.

Yaden told the court that he understood there had been some agreement between the mayor of Klamath Falls and the city council under which houses of prostitution made contributions to the city for which they were given protection.

When the defense lawyer admitted he was basing this statement on newspaper and radio reports, the judge refused to permit Hamilton to answer.

On direct examination of this witness (Hamilton) the name of Paula Benton was never mentioned," the judge said. "Therefore, you have no right on cross-examination to ask such a question."

The trial will probably be continued Saturday night. Judge Vandenberg said he would decide later on whether a night session will be held.
