OTI Director In Accident

An accident Saturday morning near Roseburg between two Klamath Falls cars resulted in minor injuries to Winston Purvine, OTI director, driver of one car and J. T. Meador, 4325 Summers Lane, operator of the other vehicle.

Mrs. Meador, daughter, Mary Janey and son John, and Mr. and Mrs. D. D. McLean, also of Klamath Falls, passengers in the Meador car were shaken up, bruised and cut by flying glass.

The wreck occurred about 15 miles west of Roseburg on the Coos Bay highway. The two cars met head-on.

Victims of the crash were taken to hospitals in Roseburg where they were given medical attention. Purvine was released Saturday afternoon and was able to attend graduation exercises at Oretch Sunday. The Meadors were released Sunday, and returned home last night.

Both cars were badly damaged.

Veteran Feared Amnesia Victim

A combat veteran of World War II, Arvid N. White, 32, is being sought by his wife, who lives at 807 West Jackson Street, Medford; telephone 2-7413.

He has been missing since May 20.

He complained of severe headaches for two weeks before that date, Mrs. White stated, and it is thought he may be suffering from amnesia. He and his wife are parents of three sons, with a fourth child expected this summer.

When last seen he was wearing working clothes and had no personal identification or possessions with him. He was employed at Medford by a dairy distributor.

He is described as 5 feet 8 inches tall, weighing 145 pounds with dark hair and brown eyes. He may wear glasses. He has a tattoo on one arm, the U.S. flag over his initials, A.N.W.

Information concerning him may be sent to the Medford police department, the Medford Mail Tribune which is aiding in the search, or directly to Mrs. White at her home.

Civil Defense Plans Reported

WASHINGTON (AP)—Civil defense planners are assuming that radar networks will be extended during the next year to give this country at least an hour's advance warning of aerial attack.

The Federal Civil Defense Administration revealed this yesterday in releasing the assumptions on which it will base its planning during the coming 12 months.

With an hour's warning, FCDA said, people in concentrated parts of target areas could be moved at least two miles toward the suburbs. While this would not eliminate casualties, the agency estimated "the casualty total would still be considerably less" than if no dispersal were attempted.

It also is assuming "that any city attacked, with very few exceptions, would be substantially destroyed."

FCDA emphasized that the assumptions, prepared periodically to aid planning, "do not predict such an attack." The assumptions are based on known or estimated Russian capabilities.



Over the GARDEN DATE

BONANZA LANGELL VALLEY Chrysanthemums were the topic at the last meeting of the Bonanza-Langell Valley Garden Club. The roll call was answered with slip or rooted start of a plant.

Mrs. Velda Haley was the speaker. She gave a list of the more hardy types of the English variety that would do all right here if an early or severe freeze in the fall does not occur. These are the larger flowering kind and it was explained how to disbud them in case larger flowers are wanted.

Among varieties mentioned that will do well here were, Crimson Buttercup, yellow and red; Karabour, rose; Commando, golden bronze; Musketeer, The Swan and

Zantha. These all bloom in September, with the exception of Zantha, a yellow that blooms in August. Lots of fertilizer of an organic type and plenty of water were recommended for good growth and bloom.

A more hardy type is the Korean mums. Those recommended were a small red, Bonfire; a pink and white, Chris Columbus, and Nyes Favorite, a pink. More of the larger flowers mentioned were: Arctic Circle, Gold Standard, Bronze Supreme, Leda, Mrs. Webster and Una. It was reported that the recent frosts did some damage to mums in various gardens.

Mrs. Juanita Lee and Mrs. Lucille Viera were hostesses. The meeting was held at the Bonanza Library.

The next meeting will also be held at the library, June 11, at 2 p.m., with Mrs. Hazel Drew, Mrs. Alice Drew and Mrs. Jean Angle as hostesses.
