About 7,500 Christian Scientists from many parts of the world, including a small group from the Klamath Falls area, attended the annual meeting of the Mother Church, the First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Massachusetts.

A message from the Christian Science Board of Directors, stressed the universal nature of spiritual understanding, and said that the healing promises of practical Christianity apply "to every human being and every group and nation."

William R. Knox, president of the Mother Church for the coming year, emphasized the conviction of Christian Scientists that God's law and power are scientifically applicable to human problems and available to all.
