Cordon Backs Crescent Job

WASHINGTON — Senator Guy Cordon announced today the inclusion in the Interior Department appropriations bill of \$297,000 for the rehabilitation of the Crescent Lake irrigation project.
 The Oregon senator is chairman of the appropriations subcommittee which drafted the Interior bill. The bill has been approved by the full committee and will go to the floor within a few days for action.
 Although there is no congressional authority for the appropriation recommended by the committee, Cordon said the project qualifies for a "finding of feasibility" by the Secretary of the Interior which would make such authorization unnecessary.
 In anticipation of such finding by Interior Secretary Douglas McKay, and in view of the importance of the work to the economy of the area, Cordon said he had persuaded the committee to go ahead with approval of an appropriation for the coming fiscal year.
 A report filed recently with the Interior Department on the Central Lake project indicated it has a sufficiently high ratio of benefits to cost to pay the project out in the statutory period of 40 years — a situation which makes it eligible for a finding or feasibility by Secretary McKay.

TALKS GENEVA — The United States was reported to have made "some progress" Thursday in direct talks with Red China on the release of Americans detained by the Peiping regime.

O&C Access Road Funds Approved

WASHINGTON — Senator Guy Cordon announced today the Senate appropriations committee has voted approval of a \$3,000,000 appropriation for construction during the new fiscal year of access roads to Oregon and California grant lands timber.
 The Senate committee wiped out a \$1,000,000 cut in the fund applied by the House to President Eisenhower's budget recommendation for such roads.
 Cordon said he had urged restoration of the cut because of the vital need for access roads to permit control of insect infestation of O & C areas, and to permit salvage of windblown timber in this connection.
 Cordon is chairman of the subcommittee which drafted the Interior appropriation bill. The bill has just been approved by the full committee and will go to the floor within the next few days for action.

Clifton Webb Deplores New Movie Accent On Violence

HOLLYWOOD — "The stage!" said Clifton Webb reflectively. "No I don't think I shall ever return to the theater."
 Webb seated himself in his spacious and tastefully decorated dressing room on the set of "A Woman's World." He had slipped into a robe and wore dark glasses with a piece of cardboard over his nose so the makeup would not be rubbed off. From a vacuum bottle he poured some milk — "Uicer, you know."
 When I declined a cigarette, he smiled, "I cannot do without them. When the doctor took me to the hospital and diagnosed the ulcer, he told me to quit smoking, and I was miserable. The slightest noise made me jump. Finally the doctor allowed me to smoke, as long as I didn't do it on an empty stomach."
 As he sipped the milk and gained solace from the cigarette, he talked about his career, past and present.
 One thing he does not like about 20th-Century culture: its preoccupation with violence.
 "I liked 'Three Coins in the Fountain,'" he commented. "It was a gentle sort of thing. Nobody was hurt in the end."
 "But that is all too rare nowadays. The movies concentrate on murder, mayhem and other forms of violence. Television is the same; it must have a terrible effect on the children."
 "Even the stage has been taken over by the so-called realism. The gentle art of high comedy, such as the shows I used to do, is virtually nonexistent. I am happy to say that Miss Ina Claire returned it to Broadway last season in 'The Confidential Clerk.' She was magnificent. But such artistry is seen all too seldom."
 Webb said he had no yen to return to the legitimate theater.
