

French Hope For Truce

PARIS (AP) — Foreign Minister Georges Bidault said Wednesday the chances of a truce in Indochina have not been fully exhausted at Geneva, but he will gladly step aside if the National Assembly thinks another negotiator could do better.

Bidault spoke before the Assembly. He explained his moves at the Geneva conference in seeking the peace which the Assembly has often requested. But he criticized the deputies for their repeated discussions of the Indochina situation.

He declared France is the only nation in the world to permit parliamentary discussions of subjects which are under diplomatic negotiation.

Bidault's address, counted on to help the government of Premier Joseph Laniel weather the storm of criticism directed at it over Indochina, was moderately applauded.

After Bidault's speech, other orators took the rostrum to criticize government policies. Premier Laniel was expected to speak Wednesday night and, depending on developments, he may call for a vote of confidence.

Big Plastic Production Predicted

NEW YORK — The plastics industry, busy feeding raw material to makers of everything from baby pants to automobiles, expects to produce more than a billion dollars worth of the stuff this year. Output is being estimated at a whopping 3,150,000,000 pounds — enough to supply you and every other American with nearly 20 pounds. That will beat last year's record production of 2,785,000,000 pounds.

George C. Miller, president of the Bakelite Co., a division of Union Carbide and Carbon Corp., points out that plastics have come into their own largely in the past dozen years. Yet, he says, they have created whole new industries, accumulated others to a complete re-birth, and given many large industries impetus for new growth.

"The music recording industry, for example," Miller says, "had a second start in life when plastics provided an unbreakable phonograph record at low cost that could be produced quickly in large quantities and with high fidelity."

He observes that all of the cars and trucks produced in this country in 1953 had windshields, made possible by plastics. Four out of every five gallons of paint contain some synthetic resin, which allows the paint to be rolled smoothly and quickly on a wall.

"Roller painting by itself has inspired a profitable new industry — yourself market for the industry," Miller says.

There are many other impressive figures: About 8 out of 10 shower curtains sold today are made of vinyl plastic film and more than 7 out of 10 raincoats are made of the same material. The 35 million dollar retail business in inflatable beach toys and backyard wading
