### GOP Voting Heaviest In California

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—California Democrats and Republicans both took heart today in the outcome of Tuesday's state election.

The Democrats rolled up their greatest primary vote of modern times.

Party leaders said the resurgence was the result of three factors, in this order: political affiliations listed on the ballot, an innovation for the direct primary; newly revived Democratic organization; an anti-Republican trend.

The Republicans, however, outpolled their rivals in the combined tally for all major races, with one exception. The size of the vote encouraged GOP predictions that they would win in November.

A Democrat, Atty. Gen. Edmund G. Brown, amassed the highest overall vote, 1,672,154, to become the only two-party victor among state officers. He won both the Democratic and Republican nominations under California's cross-filing political system.

Nearly complete returns gave Republican Gov. Goodwin J. Knight a cumulative vote of 1,551,796 to 795,969 for Richard Graves, who won the Democratic nomination for governor. Both crossed-filers.

By parties: Republican, 18,573 of 22,524 precincts—Knight, 961,972; Graves, 95,290; Cornell Gabrish, 11,121. Democratic, 18,693 precincts—Knight, 589,824; Graves, 700,699; Roderick Wilson, 97,716.

There was a similar gap between the two nominees for the U.S. Senate—Sen. Thomas H. Kuchel, Republican, and Rep. Samuel W. Yorty, Democrat.

Republican, 18,115 precincts—Kuchel, 875,440; Yorty, 83,336. Kuchel, 875,079; Yorty, 620,284. Democratic, 17,942 precincts—Kuchel total: 1,250,519; Yorty, 705,820.

### Suicide Tried In City Jail

A Los Angeles man arrested by city police on a drunk charge early Wednesday morning and placed in the drunk tank at the city jail, was later rushed to a local hospital for medical treatment after he had attempted to take his own life, officers reported this morning.

Kenneth Beckett, 1025 Wilcox, Los Angeles, who gave his local address as the Cory Hotel, cut his throat and slashed both wrists with a razor blade he had concealed in his clothing.

A physician was called and Beckett taken to the hospital where 25 stitches were taken in his neck and several in each wrist. Following treatment he was returned to jail.

### Governors Hold Session

RICHMOND, Va. (AP)—Governors and representatives of 15 states where schools are segregated voted to go into closed session Thursday to consider the Supreme Court's ruling that the practice is violative of the United States Constitution.

Acting Gov. Charley Johns of Florida objected to barring the press, and asked to be recorded as opposing the motion for a closed session made by Gov. Robert Kennon of Louisiana.

"I hardly knew what to do," he said. "Here I was going to get in the shooting again. So I sent my wife and son to live with her mother."

"I guess it's just because of red tape but it's difficult to understand that kind of red tape. I have my dog, but my wife and child are in Niagara Falls, Canada. How about that?"

Irvine met his wife while serving in Europe during World War II. He said after the war he returned to Europe and they were married in 1950 at South Sea, England.

"We got a visitor's visa for my wife and entered the U. S. with no trouble at all," he said. He was shipped to Korea in 1951 after service in the reserve.

"I believe in putting things out on the table and letting everybody hear," Gov. Johns said. He said that in the future meetings of the Florida pardon board would be open.

Gov. Kennon's motion was adopted however with only the votes of the Florida delegation noted in opposition by newsmen.

Gov. Thomas B. Stanley of Virginia was elected chairman of the conference on motion of Gov. James Byrne of South Carolina.

Johns said "complete segregation" will be "maintained in our public schools" as long as he is the chief executive in Florida.

Johns said "we believe in social progress... (but) we do not believe that progress can be obtained through coercive judicial mandates."

An agreement was reached Wednesday evening to reinstate and extend their present agreement without wage change until April 1, 1955.

Approximately 45 employees are affected.

### Soldier's Wife Refused U.S. Entry

PITTSBURGH (AP)—A National Guardsman who sent his wife to stay with her mother in Europe while he went to serve in Korea says he hasn't been able to get her readmitted to this country. His wife is not an American citizen.

She's now stranded in Niagara Falls, Canada, says Charles Irvine, 31, who commands Battery C, 70th Antiaircraft Artillery Battalion of the National Guard.

After returning from Korea, he says, he wrote his wife Lori to come home. She had been with her mother, Mrs. Arthur Mullin, a British subject, in Garmisch-Partenkirchen, Germany.

"Last month she and our son, and our dog, arrived in Montreal," Irvine said. "I went up to bring them back. And, by golly, the immigration officials said she couldn't come in on a visitor's visa."

"I didn't know what to think but they wanted papers about our marriage, papers about everything. Hell, I just gave up and came back home."

He said he was "getting damned mad."

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### Rose Festival Climax Nears

PORTLAND (AP)—The Portland Rose Festival stepped up its activities Thursday with six Navy ships in port and a new queen to rule over nightly exhibitions at Multnomah stadium.

The queen is a pretty blonde, Jan Markstaller, a Washington High School student, selected before a crowd of 22,000 at the stadium Wednesday night.

The Navy cruiser Toledo and the submarine Gudgeon tied up in the Willamette River in the heart of the city Wednesday. Four minesweepers had arrived the day before. All are open to public inspection through the Festival, which will be climaxed by the annual floral parade Saturday.

The parade has attracted a greater than usual number of floats from outside Portland—six from Oregon cities, four from Washington cities, and one from the Pasadena tournament of Roses. The Washington floats will represent the Seattle Seafair, Puget Sound Valley Daffodil Festival, city of Vancouver, and Vancouver Alcoa plant. There will be about 40 floats from Portland firms and organizations.

CIO Woodworkers struck another Oregon firm Wednesday in demand for a wage increase.

Boom men, affiliated with the Woodworkers, left their jobs at the Oregon Pulp and Paper Co. at Salem. They also put up a picket line at the firm's Oswego boom, south of Portland.

A. F. Hartung, Woodworkers' president, said the strike would affect other firms rafting their logs to Oswego.

The Woodworkers also went on strike last week against five Oregon plywood firms in demand for a pay boost.

These walkouts stemmed from negotiations that were conducted apart from the general negotiations at Portland.
