Mrs. Durham Changes Testimony

Relentless cross-examination Thursday by Defense Attorney J. C. O'Neill shattered the testimony of the state's star witness at the Arthur P. Pigg second degree murder trial.

Mrs. Eulah Durham, 44-year-old ex-wife of Roy Durham who was shot to death April 25, admitted she pictured Pigg, 73-year-old night club photographer, as a "cold-blooded murderer" to "protect Durham."

Mrs. Durham made a sworn statement shortly after the shooting in which she said Pigg shot her former husband without provocation, Thursday morning, she said on the witness stand that this statement was not true. She said she was hysterical at the time she made the false statement.

Under questioning by O'Neill, Mrs. Durham also said Pigg rented an apartment at 329 S. Eleventh Street for her. Later, she said, she moved out and Pigg took possession of the place. It was in front of this apartment that Durham was shot.

Circuit Judge David R. Vandenberg reprimanded Mrs. Durham for evasiveness in answering questions put to her by defense counsel.

After more than a day and a half on the witness stand Mrs. Durham pinpointed one version of the shooting which she said was the truth. In this statement she declared Durham went to Pigg's apartment intending to "get" the aged photographer for "telling lies to two girl friends."

Mrs. Durham quoted her ex-husband as saying: "I'm going to teach that old man to stay out of my business. He's been telling lies to my girl friends."

Mrs. Durham also told the jury that while she lived in the Eleventh Street apartment, Pigg kept her well-supplied with liquor. "He furnished plenty to drink," she said. "He always had a bottle around."

Mrs. Durham was followed to the witness chair by City Police Officer Ray Switzer. He was the first officer to reach the scene after the shooting.

Judge Vandenberg ordered a night session tonight.

Civil Defense Drill Planned

SALEM (AP)—Oregon's civil defense organizations will get their first big drill next Monday when Portland undergoes a theoretical bomb attack.

The warning of the impending "bombing" will be broadcast at 7 a. m. with the attack scheduled for 8:25 a. m.

After the warning, traffic control points will be set up at all entrances to Portland. Motorists as well as passengers on trains and buses will be given leaflets explaining the purpose of the drill.

Civil defense agencies outside of Portland also will take part in the exercise.

The illness is brought on by morning glory seeds found mixed with the rice, Kyodo said.

Russians Accused By Jap Fisherman

TOKYO (AP)—A Japanese fishing boat captain released by the Russians yesterday said he had been beaten with a leather whip by Russians who accused him of spying.

Kyodo news agency said two small fishing boats returned to Hausa in Hokkaido, Japan's northernmost main island. They were seized by the Soviets May 23.

Twelve crewmen were aboard released boats. They reported they had been held on one of the Russian-held Kurile Islands, north of Hokkaido.

They said at least 10 Japanese fishing boats and crews still were held in the area.

Polio Victim Finishes School

KALAMAZOO, Mich. (AP)—Two years ago May Lou Boucher was stricken with polio. Since then, confined to bed, she has been unable to attend regular high school classes.

But she was able to complete high school with home studies. A special tray held her books, and the pages were turned by two younger sisters. May Lou, 17, received her degree at Portage High School last night — in a wheel chair.
