

Yanks, White Sox In Vital Series

Test Awaits Leaders

If you feel the urge to make a friendly wager on tonight's big clash between the Chicago White Sox and the New York Yankees, you might consider backing the Yanks to win by one run while using at least two pitchers.

The two teams have met four times so far. New York has won three of the four, always with two or more pitchers. And every one of the games has been decided by a single run.

The White-hot White Sox come into Yankee Stadium for a four-game series leading the American League by a game and a half. They've won 16 of their last 19, seven of them in a row.

But a lot of visiting winning streaks have become mere memories in Yankee Stadium.

The last time Paul Richards' husters lost two in a row to the same team was the last Yankee series in Chicago when the White Sox led after seven innings in each game only to get beaten 4-3 and 3-2.

The White Sox had a day of rest yesterday as rain washed out their scheduled game at Philadelphia.

The Yanks took batting practice against Detroit, beating the Tigers 9-3 on home runs by Yogi Berra, Bobby Brown and Mickey Mantle.

Cleveland fell a game and a half behind Chicago by losing to Washington 8-4. Baltimore took a pair from Boston 5-1 and 9-0.

The New York Giants and Brooklyn Dodgers continued to share first place in the National League.

The Giants edged Milwaukee 1-0 on Bill Taylor's 10th-inning, pinch-hit homer. The Dodgers beat St. Louis 7-4. Philadelphia defeated Chicago 6-0 and Fred Baczewski of Cincinnati pitched his second straight shutout, 6-0 over Pittsburgh.

Ruben Gomez, who says he will be much happier when really hot weather finally arrives, pitched his third shutout as Giant pitcher stretched Milwaukee's string of scoreless innings to 25.

The Giants never threatened until Taylor's home run. They had only four hits off Gene Conley and hadn't moved a man past second. A brilliant throw by Willie Mays caught Henry Aaron trying to score for the Braves after a fly ball in the seventh.

The Dodgers broke a two-game slump with a 13-hit attack on Vic Raschi and Stu Miller. The loss was Raschi's second straight after winning his first five in the National League.

Steve Ridnik and Jim Konstanty combined for the Philadelphia shutout over the Cubs. Ridnik left with the bases loaded in the fifth and Konstanty finished up for his second victory.

The Pirates got to Baczewski for 11 hits but were all singles. The Cincinnati attack included Gus Bell's third homer in two days and Jim Greengrass' second.

Washington jumped on Bob Lemon of Cleveland for five runs in the third inning, three of them coming after George Strickland threw wild on a potential double-play ball. Dean Stone, a rookie, won his fourth straight for the Senators.

Boston's hopes of climbing out of second division received a double setback from Joe Coleman and Duane Pillette of the Orioles. Coleman spaced seven hits in winning his seventh game in the opener. Pillette allowed only five in the nightcap shutout.

Two Canadian Teams May Be Cut From WIL

The axe was about ready to fall on Calgary and Edmonton Friday as the Western International Baseball League sought to pull itself out of a financial hole.

Cries for elimination of the two Canadian prairie clubs echoed throughout the league as directors prepared to meet in Spokane Saturday to decide what action should be taken to "salvage" the 10-team circuit.

Directors of the Lewiston, Idaho baseball club Thursday instructed their president "to vote for the elimination of Calgary and Edmonton from the Western International League."

And at Salem, Ore., President Bruce Williams and directors of the Senators' ball club said demands they would present at the Spokane confab would include the teams. Williams estimated the cost of a week's trip to play those teams at \$2,500.

The Lewiston board of directors also instructed President James B. McMonigle to vote that the Broncos refuse to travel to the prairie cities for a scheduled series next week.

McMonigle later said "this doesn't necessarily mean Lewiston won't fulfill this part of the schedule, if it is in the minority."

Other demands listed by the Salem directors were:

1. Adoption of a rule to restrict the number of players with long experience.

2. Elimination of the rule that allows the home team to keep all the gate receipts. (Williams said he advocates a 60-40 split with the home team taking the larger portion.)

3. Reclassification of the league from Class A to either B or C. Earlier this week there were reports the WIL would disband or reorganize into a smaller circuit. The possibility of eliminating Vancouver and Victoria also was suggested.

Newspapers in Salem, Portland and Spokane Wednesday quoted reliable sources as saying the league would either have to fold or cut the number of teams.

Although League President Robert B. Abel denied reports he had asked members to disband the 10-team circuit, he did say the financial situation was serious. The Spokane meeting, he explained, was called to consider what action should be taken.

Meantime, as the saying goes, "the show must go on." And four games, including a doubleheader at Edmonton were played Thursday

night.

Wenatchee moved into 1½ games of Vancouver by trimming the Caps, 5-1, at Vancouver. Victoria rallied in the ninth inning to nip Yakima, 6-4, and Calgary and Edmonton broke even in their twin bill, Calgary winning the seven

inning opener, 6-1, but losing the nightcap, 2-1.

Right-hander Billy Joe Waters showed plenty of control for Wenatchee as he rationed seven hits and gave up only walk to Vancouver. He allowed just one extra blow, a double by power-hitting Dick Greco. Tom Munoz assured the Chiefs' victory in the fourth as he homered with one man aboard.

Wenatchee centerfielder Joe Unfried had a perfect night at the bat, hitting four for four.

Home Run Costs Durocher

CHICAGO (U.P.) — Leo Durocher

bought the New York Giants a share of first place in the National League for \$100.

The financial transaction came to light today when the New York manager admitted he made the offer as he sent rookie Bill Taylor up to pinch hit in the 10th inning at Milwaukee yesterday.

"I told the players in the dugout, 'If he hits a homer I'll give him \$100,'" Durocher said.

Taylor, fresh from the Southern Association, slammed Gene Conley's 1-1 pitch for the only run of the game.

"That cost me \$100 and I'm glad to pay it," Durocher said.

Success in the 10-inning spintangler demonstrated again that what left New York as virtually a one-man show starring Willie Mays has turned into a team parade with everybody getting in on the act.

Ruben Gomez turned in his third shutout.

Mays maintained a part of his starring role. It was his spectacular catch and throw to the plate that nipped Henry Aaron trying to score in the seventh inning.

Gomez and Johnny Antonelli, the prize package in the Giants' big winter trade with Milwaukee, have shouldered the pitching burdens. Against the hard-hitting Braves they combined for back-to-back shutouts. Antonelli has won eight, Gomez six.

The Western trip, on which the Giants have won eight out of nine games, has brought an end to Al Dark's prolonged hitting slump.

The team captain left New York with an anemic .244 average. Today he's an even .300.

Monte Irvin has improved too. His average isn't much better but his hits have been more timely.

Jones, Giardello In 'Fixed' Battle

NEW YORK (U.P.) — A week ago the

news of a "fight fix" attempt startled the nation. Tonight the fight is to be held at Madison Square Garden with Joey Giardello boxing Bobby Jones.

Jones turned down a reported \$5,000 bribe, allegedly offered by heavyweights Clarence Henry, to "fix" the Giardello fight and the district attorney's office launched a full-scale investigation. For a week Jones has trained with a detective as a bodyguard, day and night.

Despite the arrests and publicity, Giardello still remains a 2-1 favorite over the 28-year-old Oakland, Calif. boxer, just as he did a week ago.

The 10-round middleweight match will be carried on network radio (ABC) and television (NBC) with two judges and a referee giving a decision on a round basis. It is scheduled for 9 p.m. EST.

Jones' record never was too interesting until he upset Gil Turner in March and stopped him in a rematch, both at Philadelphia. As a result he moved up to the No. 7 spot in the middleweight rank-

ings. He is a cagey boxer with a 37-19-8 record for 64 bouts and only five knockouts in a career dating back to 1945.

Giardello was set for a title bout with Bobo Olson in October until he was upset by Pierre Langlois May 21. After the Langlois defeat he was dropped from No. 1 contender to the No. 3 spot. The Phil-

adelphia boxer's record is 49-11-5 for 66 bouts.

The Lotteries held the team honors of high series with their 1416 series score and the Three Angels had second spot with a 1408.

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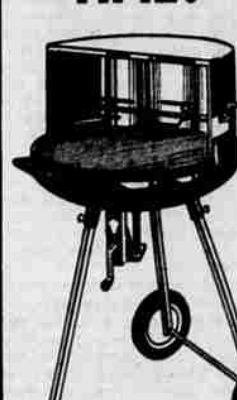
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
